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TEXT OF THE THRONE SPEECH

The following is the full text of the Speech from the Throne delivered at Ottawa on Thursday by Mr. Justice L. P. Duff: "Honorable Members of the Senate: Members of the House of Commons: I welcome you to your duties at a time when the nations of the world are passing through a period of great economic depression.

"The following is the standing of my government to combat all influences which are inimical to the social and economic welfare of this Dominion, an order in council has been passed prohibiting the importation of certain commodities into Canada from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

"Pursuant to the fixed policy of my government to combat all influences which are inimical to the social and economic welfare of this Dominion, an order in council has been passed prohibiting the importation of certain commodities into Canada from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

"The operation of the Unemployment Relief Act, 1930, has proved equally beneficial. While the grant authorized by this Act could not immediately have checked unemployment arising from causes of which you have full knowledge, yet its careful administration by my Ministers, aided by the provincial and municipal governments and the two great railway systems, has resulted in the institution of a nation-wide program of public undertakings, each one a unit in a scheme of national development, which have collectively provided work for the greatest number of men who have ever been employed through the direct efforts of the Federal Government.

"The present situation has emphasized the necessity of effecting reduction in the costs of production and marketing of the wheat crop and of providing more stable markets, as the welfare of all parts of Canada is involved in satisfactory returns being received by the grain growers.

"You will be asked to consider such further revision of the tariff as may be carried out, with but incidental adjustments to the British preference schedules now in force.

"The public accounts for the last fiscal year and the estimates for the coming year will be submitted at an early date. The estimates will manifest my ministers' resolve that, until the revenues of the country reflect a definite improvement in the economic situation, every economy compatible with the proper administration of the state will be exercised.

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EVIDENCE CONCLUDED IN ACCIDENT CASE

The hearing of the case of J. Hawkins vs. Wm. Munn, the Nicholson Oil Co., Ltd., and the Nicholson Oil Co., continued at the Supreme Court yesterday. Evidence was given for the Nicholson Oil Co. Ltd. by Alex. Nicholson, driver of the truck involved in the collision with Wm. Munn's car at the intersection of the Mainque and Roway Roads on July 5 last.

Mr. J. J. Johnston, counsel for the defendant and called the witness Alex. Nicholson, (SW11) testified that he was driving the Nicholson Oil Co. truck when the accident occurred. He stated that Munn's car came to the intersection travelling on the left side of the Roway Road.

Witness examined by Mr. W. E. Bentley K. C., witness stated that he was about fifteen or twenty feet from the intersection of the Roway Road when he first saw the car or about thirty feet from the car. Witness applied the brakes as soon as he saw the car. Witness had slowed up when crossing a rough place further up the road.

Q—How far did the rough place continue? A—Up to the intersection, pretty much.

Q—Would you say that Munn was going fast when he came out of the Roway Road? A—Not very fast.

Witness stated that he had driven the truck many times previously.

Q—Have you been charged in court with fault in driving? A—Yes.

Q—Ever fined? A—No.

Witness examined by Mr. H. F. McPhoe witness stated that he had attempted to swing to the right but when Munn's car stopped suddenly, witness knew that he could not get through. He tried to swing the car to the left but there was not room. Witness immediately jumped out of the truck and helped to get those who were injured out of the car. Munn said "You will pay well for this."

Cross examined by Mr. Thane Campbell witness was asked: Could you see any reason why Mr. Munn could not operate his car on the right side of the Roway Road? Q—No, I could see no reason.

Q—But as a matter of fact he was on the left side? A—Yes.

The automobile appeared to be going straight across the road, witness said.

Q—Up to the point where you struck him did his speed continue about the same? A—It was my impression that he stopped suddenly.

Q—You saw no warning that he was going to stop there? A—No.

According to the point indicated on the diagram the truck pushed the car a distance of 42 feet, witness admitted.

Court adjourned till 10:30 Monday morning.

Late Market News

MONTREAL, Que., March 13—On the produce and dairy market here day prices of eggs and butter were lower while cheese and potato quotations were unchanged. Prices of fresh eggs, in cartons, declined from one to two cents a dozen, fresh Ontario and Prairie extras, firsts and seconds in cartons all lost one to two cents a dozen, respectively. British Columbia fresh extras and firsts were off one cent at 28 and 29 a dozen. While pullets were unchanged at 26 cents. Quotations to retailers were unchanged. Receipts were 2606 cases. On the butter market prices of re-graded eastern townships and fresh western number 1 dropped one quarter of a cent at 31 1-4 to 31 1-2 cents a pound. To retailers solids were unchanged at 33 to 34 cents and prints 34 to 35 cents a pound. Receipts were 432 boxes. Winter colored cheese was quoted at 14 1-2 to 14 3-4 cents a pound and winter white at 12 cents a pound. Receipts were 48 boxes.

NEW BRUNSWICK GREEN MOUNTAINS, in cartons, were quoted at 80 cents per 90 pounds bulk and to retailers 90 cents per 80 pound bag. For shipment after Monday under the new system of bag shipments prices were quoted at 77 1-2 cents per 80 pound bag.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—Prices here are again lower with wholesalers paying producers for eggs extras 18 to 19, firsts 15 to 16, pullet extras 14. Wholesale prices to retail stores are extras 23 to 24 firsts 21 to 22 pullet extras 20.
