

FOUR FREIGHT TRAINS COLLIDE

FAIRFIELD, Conn., June 7—Although blocked this morning with wreckage wreckers have been at work since last midnight the tracks of the N. Y., N. H., and Hartford railroad were still caused by the collision of four freight trains shortly before midnight, in which four persons are known to have been killed and at least seven injured, and there is but little prospect of the tracks being cleared so that traffic can be resumed before noon.

FORMER PREMIER OF FRANCE DEAD

PARIS, June 7—Senator Maurice Rouvier, twice Premier of France, died here today. He was born at Aix in 1842. He was elected a member of the National Assembly in 1875, and in 1881 he was appointed Minister of Commerce in the Gambetta Cabinet. In 1887 he became Premier taking also the portfolio of Finance.

(Continued from page 1) must be sick or something." He said "she is no more sick than you are." I said "I will call for her Sunday and take her to Sunday school and see if she will do her any good." He said "all right." This conversation took place in the porch. I knew nothing about the bell. The day after she was buried he and his children were in Sunday school. Don't re-member having seen them there before. Had a talk with him coming home. Asked him if he was timid about the house. He said, "No, there was only one other place in the house where she could hang herself and that was upstairs. My husband said to the prisoner that he heard Dr. McIntyre was sent for, and the prisoner replied, "There were no marks on the body." Prisoner said Dr. McIntyre came along the road and he met him at Molyneux's bridge. He told Dr. McIntyre there was no need for him going to see her. Prisoner showed me a post card he got from Wm. McKinnon the day after the tragedy. The prisoner was at the house looking for my husband. He showed the card he got to go for the pig. On one occasion I said to him, "Will, did you ever hit your wife?" He said he did once when Arthur was a baby. He gave her a slap in the face for throwing the baby on the floor. He said some of the McBeth's were there the next day and knew of it. Spoke also of getting a housekeeper. The day of the funeral he kept repeating the words, "I wish I had stayed home and this would not have happened." I do not know the evening of his wife's death. Sunday I walked home with her she said she was going to leave her husband in the fall.

To Mr. Stewart: Two weeks before his wife's death the prisoner was at our house repairing a pump. Dr. Lester Rehault (deceased) have been acquainted with the prisoner only since tragedy. Was not acquainted with his wife. I performed the autopsy. Found head covered with very short hair. There was a slight mark on one leg which I would not consider of any significance. Found mark of congealed blood on back caused by blood flowing into that part of the body occupying the lowest position. Saw light scratches on face, one on right side of forehead, one right side of nose, one on right side of chin. There was a break in the skin under the left ear. Mark on right side of face could scarcely be called an abrasion of the skin. Saw the marks on throat. There was one right under the throat from the angle of the jaw on the right side, just above the Adam's apple, around about an inch below the angle of the jaw on the left side. It extended until it reached the bone about an inch from the bottom of the ear. In my opinion there was no ecchymosis in that mark. Would not like to say when that mark was made. There was another mark passing over the thyroid cartilage. It extended from a point about two inches below the centre line in front. The lower mark was horizontal while the upper one had a slant. There were three marks, two of which touched together in front. The width of the upper one in front would be 1/2 to 3/4 inch. The lower and more irregular; not quite so wide and more irregular; it was narrower in front and wider in the side. There was a double mark on the right side. The upper mark went back a little further than the middle one. I applied my hand to back an inch from the neck, with the result that my hand would not fit to it very well. I opened up the throat all the way down to the bronchiae. The upper mark was hard to cut through and there was no indentation there. There was no indentation in the lower mark. I examined the windpipe and found it natural enough on the fact that it is very soft—about as soft as an ordinary handkerchief. There is no doubt that the upper mark was caused by a rope, the lower mark was more apparent in that it was more discolored; the upper mark had a different appearance in that it seemed to be indented.
