WARDS 1 AND 2

HOLD A MEETING

In the Catholic Literary Institute Hall on Dorchester St., last night, a meeting was called in the interests of Wards 1 and 2, for the purpose of nominating candidates for Mayor and Councillors at the forthcoming civic election. The Hall was crowded.

J. W. Hodgson was appointed Chairman and called the meeting to order. The nominations for Mayor then took place. Dr. F. F. Kelly was proposed by Geo. I. Foster, and seconded by James H. Reddin. James Paton was proposed by James Barratt, and seconded by J. B. Garaham. The movers and seconders of both nominees spoke briefly and to the point and the candidates in acknowledging the nominations referred chiefly to their past records at the Council board and expressed themselves as favorable to a continuance of the policy of making permanent improvements.

For Councillor for Ward One D. O'M. Reddin was proposed by James M. Hennessey, and seconded by Hugh Hennessey.

For Ward Two, Daniel J. Riley was proposed for Councillor by A. E. MacEachern, and seconded by G. W. Gardiner. Messrs. Reddin and Riley, made suitable replies.

Other speakers were Dr. Alley, John McKenna, R. B. Norton and Simon Ho'ger. The remarks of the different speakers were with one exception marked with the spirit of tolerance and amity—and the meeting was conducted with praiseworthy decorum.

She was about 100 years of age and until recently had enjoyed good health and was in the unimpaired possession of all her faculties. Rev. Angus McDonald, formerly of Caledonia, but now of Bar Harbor, Maine, was a grandson, whom many of your readers will remember as having a few years ago come into possession of money and estates variously estimated at from half a million to \$700,000, which was bequeathed him by a former rich artisan in Florida.

Over thirty tables were required to accommodate the whist players, while the fine dancing hall, upstairs, was brilliantly lit and presented a charming scene. Supper was served at midnight. O'M Reddin, Mrs. (Dr.) Kelly, Mrs. (Dr.) Conroy, Mrs. Hornsby. The function was under the auspices of the St. Charles Auxiliary Society, of which Mrs. P. S. Brown is President, and Mrs. Hewitt, Secretary. A substantial sum will be realized for the Hospital.

VICTORIA DIVISION had an increasingly large number present at the meeting last night. The beautiful ceremony of Initiation was again conducted by Worthy Patriarch McNair. The Scotch program was resumed and after a number of fine selections was concluded with a humorous Scotch reading by Bro. Ferguson. Before closing the Division suitable reference was made to the grand Prohibition victory in Prince County by several of the older members. Pleasure was derived from the fact that John P. Tanton the oldest Past Grand Worthy Patriarch in Canada was present. His ringing speech was listened to with the closest attention. Next Monday night the Division at Little York will return the fraternal visit of Victoria and a very pleasant time is in store for all who will be fortunate enough to be present.

THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed the enrolment to be 1108; the average attendance 96; percentage of attendance 87; number of cases of tardiness 318; number of truants 3; visits to parents 297; number of notices 49; cases of corporate punishment 5; below average in grading 50; requests to leave school before closing 53. The resignation of W. E. Curtis, vice principal West Kent St. School was received and accepted and Leo N. Seaman was made vice principal. John H. McFadyen was appointed to the position vacated by Mr. Seaman. At the suggestion of the principals it was agreed that certain dates be set apart to examine the copy books and work books of pupils—details of same to be left to supervisor and principals. The estimates were taken up and discussed and will be submitted to the Council at the next meeting. Meeting adjourned.

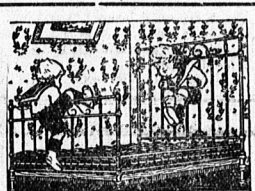
