At a meeting of the Charlottetown Driving Club held last night it was decided to hold ice races Thursday afternoon. The course selected is almost parallel to the west side of Hillsborough Bridge. The two races which will take place are: Class A race with Mac Aubrey and Colonel Waltz as starters. Class A. Trot, Mac Todd, Mac Cresus, Baby Todd, Stella Todd and Our Peggy as starters.

The track committee are raking some rough spots on the ice so that a keen course will be secured for Thursday afternoon.

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—(EGGS)—The market is very nervous and unsettled and further sharp declines is expected very shortly. Ontario country shippers report paying extras 44 to 45, firs 40 to 42, seconds 38 to 40, thirds 36 to 38. Correspondent writes that an enormous quantity of pickled eggs from the Continent have been thrown into the market and hold at very low prices. These eggs which were contracted for at the early part of the season at 17 or 18 cents per bushel, are now at 12 or 13 cents.

They have been changing hands recently from 11 to 12.

Toronto specials, jobbing 55c. extras 53, firs 50, seconds 46.

Montreal firm, moving to light receipts, prices unchanged but lower prices anticipated in the near future.

Winnipeg dealers quoting country shippers delivered extras 50 to 52, firs 45 to 47, seconds 39, z 38.

Saskatoon dealers quoting country shippers delivered extras 50 to 55, firs 45 to 50.

Alberta dealers quoting country shippers delivered, extras 40 to 50, firs 35 to 45, seconds 30.

British Columbia market weak, dealers paying delivered extras 33, firs 31.

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 16.—The foreign demand for C. D. N. grain here today was of a very limited nature owing to buyers not responding to the higher prices demanded. There has been a good demand from millers in this market for C. D. N. spring wheat, and late Saturday and today, sales amounting to between 750,000 and 1,000,000 bushels were made. No. 3 northern selling at 1 cent per bushel under the May option, and No 4 wheat 7 cents per bushel under C. I. F. bay ports. Business was quiet in the domestic market and prices were steady. Ontario No 3 white oats being quoted at 65 cents and No 4 at 63 cents per bushel, extra store. Prices were well maintained for all grades of spring wheat flour and the trade volume was moderate. The winter wheat flour market was without any new feature to note. Owing to the large orders that have come forward from the continent for spring grades of flour of late, coupled with the increased demand from the United Kingdom for supplies, also generally, have been compelled to increase their output to fill the same. The price of mill feed has been large with the result that a weaker feeling developed and prices were reduced another \$2.00 per ton which makes a net reduction of \$4.00 in the last few days, with the indications that they will go lower. The market for rolled oats was active and firm. The egg market was moderately active and prices were firm. The butter trade was inactive although prices showed no change. Little business was transacted in cheeses with fodder market, white colored goods quoted at 20 1/4 to 20 1/2 cents per pound and No. 2 grade at 19 1/4 to 19 1/2 cents per pound. Beans were firm at \$2.90 per bushel.
