Four Classes Scheduled For Covehead Race Track This Afternoon

Baseball fans will have a chance of witnessing another game of their favorite sport tonight when the All Stars tangle with the navy team in the third and deciding game of their best of three exhibition series.

All Stars won the first encounter but the Navy came right back to knot the count at one in the second tussle and both teams, although there is nothing at stake are eager to win the rubber fixture.

Only a few months before the attack at Pearl Harbor, Overlin dropped his title to Billy Goetz in a 16-round contest. This is the only defeat that year was a 16-round decision won by Vincent Goetz who soon after took the title that Overlin was to wrest from Cotorino Garcia in May, 1940.

It was not many months after the Pearl Harbor raid that Overlin was back in the Navy. Yes, he has a return engagement here for Ken, he having joined up in 1927 for a seven-year stretch.

It was while on shipboard that Overlin was induced to put on the gloves for the first time. This is the only time that he has ever boxed professionally in 1930. His only defeat that year was a 16-round decision won by Vincent Goetz who soon after took the title that Overlin was to wrest from Cotorino Garcia in May, 1940.

Though he had fought all over the world with almost unintermitted success against most of the 160-pounders of prominence, Overlin did not break into New York until 1937. He was defeated on the occasion of Fred Aponte's first appearance in that city.

Ken was the winner, but in the same year suffered the only knock-out in his career. After being knocked out by Freddie Steele at Seattle he was laid low with yellow jaundice. There were two postponements but he was ultimately rushed into the ring in poor shape and was stopped in four rounds.

Overlin is one of the most colorful men in the ring, though his antics as a playboy are probably overrated. He is also one of the most courageous. Few will forget the night when the Ancient Mariner, as he was dubbed, successfully defended his title against hard-hitting Steve Belose, though he (Overlin) climbed through the ropes a pretty sick individual. His winning performance was accomplished almost on head and heart alone.

With a few bouts under his belt Ken says he'll be ready to go after the light-heavyweight crown as he still has the heart and head who can tell?

S'ide Team Wins Second Game Of Series 10-6 But Island Title Still Undecided

Scoring four runs in the first half of the eighth inning to break a 6-1 deadlock Summerside R.C.A.F. team last night defeated the Charlottetown R.C.A.F. squad 10-6 in the second game of the Island softball title series, but whether the victory, their second straight meant the Island title for them is still very much in doubt.

Only one Tiger regular, second baseman Jimmy Bloodworth, and two pitchers, Tommy Bridges and Virgil Trucks, are absent from the seventh although the losers had won on first and second in the out but failed to come through with a hit in the pinch. Two more Charlottetown errors, two bases on balls and two wild pitches gave the visitors four more runs in their eighth inning upturn and secured the win in the eighth. After that the batters made futile attempts to hit being finally retired. He got Hershel Martin, a spirited outfielder from Milwaukee; George Swirweis, a disappointment while serving as second fiddle to Gordon, developed into a standout fielder, the team's leading hitter and the league's top base stealer. Oscar Grimes, shaky for a while, became an adequate replacement for Johnson at third, while Frank Crosetti's return cleared a major problem at shortstop.

Hemslay, until called to the colors recently, was a capable fill-in for Dickey and the unexpected steadiness of Mike Cletchak has kept the catching up to par. No pitcher was able to match Chandler, but such rookies as Mel Queen, Floyd Havens and Walter Dubiel combined to fill the gap.

LONDON, Sept. 12 - (CP Cable) - Premier Drew of Ontario, opening an Ontario services club here today, said Britons going to Canada after the war would not be journeying to strange soil any more than a person who was moving from Devon to Lincoln or from Belfast to Birmingham.

"Canada is a friendly substantial movement of the population."

The Premier emphasized that the club was not exclusively for Ontario servicemen but for all Canadians and their friends among the Allies.

Viscount Cranborne, Dominions secretary, Viscount Bennett and Maj.-Gen. P. J. Montague, senior officer, Canadian military headquarters, were in the large gathering at the opening ceremony.

Except for the kitchen the club is staffed by about 50 air's of the Canadian Red Cross who were recently arrived from Canada.

The officer commanding the Red Cross contingent is Mrs. Ronald S. Brown of Saint John, N.B.

In 1907, the year of its incorporation, T.C.A. operated over a route 128 miles long. Today its routes total 5,276 miles and its aircraft fly annually between 9,000,000 and 10,000,000 miles, on regular service between St. John's, Newfoundland and Victoria, B.C., between Toronto and New York, Toronto, London and Windsor, and between Lethbridge, Calgary and Edmonton.

Trans-Canada Air Lines also operates for the Dominion Government a trans-Atlantic air mail service for the troops overseas. In the first year of daily transatlantic operation, 1939, T.C.A. had 21,569 passengers. The estimate for this year is 169,734.
