Completion Of Huge Flying Boat Delayed

LONDON, Nov. 7—(AP)—Hopes of flight testing by next year a giant British flying boat designed to carry 100 passengers to New York at 380 miles an hour have been smashed by delay in engine deliveries.

Builders of the 140-ton Saunders-Roe "Princess", the world's largest commercial flying boat, say its test will be delayed until 1951 because turbo-jet engines will not be available until April of that year.

The Bristol Aeroplane Company, designers of the husky powerplants, and Saunders-Roe, Limited, jointly announced the delay.

The British Overseas Airways Corporation has ordered three of the huge planes for non-stop use between Britain and New York. "The announced delay may mean, however, that the 'Princesses', which by available means are diverted to British-South American or other routes.

"It is hoped the delay will not affect more than the starting date of flight trials," a Saunders-Roe spokesman said. "It is still expected the planes will be delivered to B.O.A.C. in 1953 as scheduled."

Some observers here felt any delay in the flying boat delivery could result in their being pushed aside in favor of Aster jet-landplanes.

This is possible, it was pointed out, especially on the trans-Atlantic luxury route, where the race for speed and service is bound to intensify during the next three or four years.

Two Children Burned

BENTLEY, Alta., Nov. 7—(CP)—Two children were burned to death when their home in this village, 70 miles southwest of Edmonton, burned to the ground today. Two others escaped. Dead are Roy Cox, seven, and Kay Cox, five, children of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Cox. A third child, Sharon Helen, three, was rescued. Mr. and Mrs. Cox left their three children and the Helm boy in the care of a neighbor. They returned shortly before midnight and decided to walk home with the baby-sitter. When they returned the house was a mass of flames.

Boston's Mayor Faces Stiff Challenge At Polls

BOSTON, Nov. 7—(AP)—Boston's Mayor James M. Curley—a political boss who loves the limelight—faces a stiff challenge in his bid for a fifth term, virtually on the eve of his 75th birthday.

With the election only four days off, the veteran Curley still shapes up in the eyes of politicians as the man to beat in a field of five. But, he admittedly is in a fight.

There's only one issue in the campaign—"Curleyism."

Curley says it's good for Boston; his four opponents claim it's bad. The Government will help fight Curleyism.

Curley's opponent appears to be City Clerk John B. Hynes, who set in as "acting mayor" for five months in 1947 when Curley went to a Federal penitentiary for mail fraud.

Curley himself is looking forward to the Nov. 8 election for vindication from the voters—shouting he was convicted through innocent of any wrong-doing in connection with a firm set up to obtain war contracts for clients.

Both Curley and Hynes have been the target of the three other candidates—Patrick McDonough, George F. Oakes, and Walter O'Brien.

Curley, Hynes and McDonough are Democrats; Oakes a Republican, and O'Brien a member of the Progressive Party.

The 52-year-old Hynes has lined up strong Republican support. Curley charges Hynes with being the "puppet of State Street Republican bankers scheming to gain control of city hall"—describes himself as "unbossed."

Hynes posters tell the story of his campaign—"Restore Boston's good name" and "keep Boston respectable."

Curley replies—"Curley gets things done" and "action with Curley."

As for winning after serving a prison term—Curley did it once before. He was re-elected alderman at the start of his political career after serving a jail term for taking a postal examination for a friend.

He made political capital of the incident—explaining "it goes to show you how far I'll go for a friend."

Approaching 75, he says: "I expect to live to be 125—and I expect to be mayor all that time."

"Law is always the law of one social class, but while in the old times it had been the law of a privileged minority, it is today the law of the overwhelming majority, the law of the workers."

In the medical field, Dr. Gyorgy Oskany, secretary-general of the Doctors' Trade Union, had this to say:

"We cannot tolerate that our medical science should follow Western medical science, based on imperialist ideology and being against the people. We want socialist medical science."

Nevertheless, there are those here who doubt the effect of these campaigns on the older generation, primarily because of the obstacles of the Russian language. Many scientists in this country speak two Western languages, few of them know Russian.

Ontario Farmer Charged With Murder Of Wife

COBURG, Ont., Nov. 7—(CP)—Police charged today with the slaying of his wife, Irene, 54, neighbors of the quiet-flying couple, indicated the breakfast-time tragedy had all the elements of a mercy killing.

The 56-year-old farmer was charged after police found Mrs. Kilborn's body slumped over a table in their 16-room brick house at Balleboro, 16 miles northwest of this Lake Ontario town. He was remanded to Nov. 8.

Police, who declined comment on the neighbors' reports, went to the Kilborn farm in answer to a call by Charles Barnard, Mr. Barnard, who worked the Kilborn farm on shares, quoted the farmer as having said his wife shot herself in the stomach and he "finished her off to end her misery."

The shooting came as the couple prepared to leave for Whitby, Ont., where Mrs. Kilborn was to have entered the Ontario Mental Hospital Wednesday.

Gives Report On Catching Herring By Jacklight

HALIFAX, Nov. 7—(CP)—Every jacklight herring?

The moon apparently has an effect on herring catches. Therefore, artificial light can be used to attract the fish.

This subject was discussed today by S. N. Tibbo of the Fisheries Biological Station at St. Andrews, N.B.

Mr. Tibbo said an analysis of catch records showed that the number of herring available is lowest during the weeks in which the moon is new and full and highest during the weeks when it is in the first and third quarters.

The reason might be merely the effect of tidal currents—or it might be due to the amount of light coming from the moon.

The next experimental step was this:

"We have some experimental evidence to show that artificial light will attract or repel herring depending on the degree of light intensity, or, in other words, the strength of the bulb and the distance that it is away from the fish."

An experiment conducted at the biological station showed that herring were strongly attracted to light of very low intensity and that this tendency was reduced with an increase in candlepower. Actually, a 7.12-watt bulb covered with a dark blue glass exerted the greatest attraction, but a 60-watt bulb without any covering had the opposite effect."

This evidence has been used by fishermen to help them catch more fish.

One method of fishing in Japan employs a long string of lights extending out from shore. These lights can be extinguished in succession. The fish are gradually led inshore where they can be more easily taken by the fishermen.

Mr. Tibbo said it is planned to carry out further experiments in the Bay of Fundy and St. Lawrence Gulf to test the effect of artificial lights on movements of herring and to discover whether these lights will assist in the capture of larger quantities.

Highlights In Rent Control Policy

OTTAWA, Nov. 7—(CP)—Highlights of Finance Minister Abbott's announcements yesterday on rent regulations:

The Government wants to abolish rent-controls eventually but prefers to do it on its own time and in its own way.

The Government has decided to refer the question of validity of rental regulations to the Supreme Court.

If the regulations are declared valid, the Government plans to extend rent-control beyond March 31, 1950.

If the regulations are declared invalid, the Government will be free to prepare a standby rent control regulations.

The Government remains willing to vacate the rent-control field to any Province making a formal request.

Rentals for rooms in which tenants must share toilet facilities or other similar equipment may be increased 20 per cent.

Landlords of accommodation in which tenants share toilet facilities may terminate any lease on six months' notice.

A 20-per-cent increase in rents on unheated, self-contained dwellings is permitted in exchange for a one-year lease.

Landlords may increase rents by 25 per cent on heated, self-contained dwellings provided they offer a one-year lease.

Two-year leases agreed upon by tenants and landlords will be signed without specific approval of the rentals administrator.

Landlords who owned accommodation before Nov. 1, 1949, can gain possession on six months' notice if they want the accommodation for their own use.

The new regulations become effective Dec. 15, 1949.
