MEETS IN CENTREVILLE

Prof McMillan Delivers a Practical Address Upon Dairy Cows.

A meeting of the Bedeque Branch of the Farmer's and Dairymen's Association was held in Centreville hall at 2.30 p. m. on Thursday. There was a fair attendance of farmers from the surrounding districts. The president of the Society, Mr. Humphrey, presided, and introduced Prof. E. J. McMillan who gave a short talk on "The Feed and Care of the Dairy Cow." The speakers reviewed briefly the progress made by the dairy industry in this country, pointed out the advantages possessed by the dairy cow as an economical producer of human food when compared with other classes of farm stock, and in consequence of these facts remarked that the dairying industry has come to stay.

The different foods produced and fed on the farm were then discussed. The ration for the dairy cow should be properly balanced, succulent and palatable. The different ingredients of the food, each of which fills its own place in the animal economy, should be present in the proper proportion, or as is generally agreed, about one of the fresh forming nutrients to five of the heat and fat formers. Mixed pasture grass fulfills all these requirements and is a perfect food. A mixture of peas and oats, cut in full bloom is the best supplementary food for summer feeding.

Corn can be fed in the fall with good results. The crop should not be cut until well matured, otherwise a large proportion of the feeding value will be lost. Roots may be made to take the place of corn in supplying succulence to the winter ration. Care as well as feed is necessary in order to secure the best returns from a dairy herd. During hot weather the cattle might be put in the stable in day time with advantage. Shelter should be provided in the pastures. The waste land in the fence corners if planted with trees will become useful in this way and at the same time aid in beautifying the farm. The advantages of the institute system were set forth briefly. Farmers should join the Institute society and take advantage of the opportunities there afforded for the acquisition of more knowledge in regard to farming methods and the interchange of ideas born of practical experiences. The Institute system has brought about a great improvement in farming methods abroad, and is well worthy of a trial at the hands of the farmers of Prince Edward Island.

The majority of those in attendance, however, decided to withhold their assent until the matter shall have received further consideration. A lively discussion, participated in by a number of members of the society added much to the interest of the meeting. A vote of thanks was then tendered the lecturer and the meeting adjourned.

FARMERS' MEETING

To Form an Agricultural Society

HELD AT WELLINGTON

Speeches Made by Hon B Rogers and W. W. Hubbard.

WELLINGTON, June 20.—The agricultural meeting in the C. M. B. A. hall here last evening was attended by fifty of our representative farmers and steps were taken to organize an Agricultural Society. J. F. Arsenault, M. P. P. presided and among those present were the following who later subscribed to the membership of the proposed society:—

Hon. B. Rogers, Com. of Agriculture and W. W. Hubbard, Editor of the Maritime Farmer, Sussex, N. B. were present and addressed the meeting.

Before the meeting opened Mr. Hubbard gave a practical talk upon the selection of dairy cows, with two cows before him on the road. The people formed a circle and the speaker compared the animals pointed out their deficiencies and their good points and evoked a considerable interest.

After the audience were seated in the hall he continued his address upon the question of the dairy cow, rearing the dairy heifer and other matters.

Hon. B. Rogers spoke next upon the organization of Agricultural Societies and Farmers' Institutes. By the Act of last session the Legislature had sought to combine the good points of both the Ontario and Nova Scotia systems. In the latter the societies devoted themselves almost entirely to the improvement of stock while in Ontario they were for educational purposes.

By this Act it was proposed to give \$50 of a grant to a society which would secure a membership of fifty or over and subscribe among themselves in membership fees at least \$40.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture was prepared to help, by sending good speakers to the Province to assist at these educational meetings. Every Society was expected to devote at least ten per cent of their funds to the carrying forward of this educational work and local men were expected to prepare themselves to read papers and discuss the addresses of the visiting speakers.

The Island had been divided into thirty-three Agricultural Districts in each of which one society would receive a bonus. The district in which Wellington was located would comprise lots 14, 15 and that part of 16 west of the Western Road.

He thought it was "time our farmers were taking hold of their business in earnest. Shipbuilding was a business of the past, fishing was not as profitable as heretofore—we had no forests, nor no mines and it was upon our soil we must depend for the support of the people.

We could not continue to profitably farm as we had been doing in the past. Potatoes were once 40 and 50 cents per bushel and oats the same price, then on a virgin soil it paid to raise and sell these crops, to-day it would not.

The markets to-day were demanding a higher class of product, beef was wanted as well as other meats, butter and cheese were wanted and large quantities of poultry were wanted. Our people must go largely into the production of these articles if they would farm at a profit. To make these products well and cheaply, a great deal of skill and attention were required. Better cattle were required and skilful care and feeding.

From what he knew of the people of this district he felt sure they would soon have one of the best Agricultural societies on the Island.

He advised them to combine their farmer's club. With this society, they could as well carry along the work of the club and it would avoid having two organizations. It would not be allowable, however, to take the money received from the Government or from their membership fees for commercial purposes it must be used for the improvement of stock or the improvement of seeds or for educational purposes.

He was loudly applauded on resuming his seat.

J. F. Arsenault thought it was very desirable that the farmers should take up this offer of the Government and secure the \$50. By a little canvassing he felt a strong society could be secured. He went on to say that education was just as necessary for the farmer as the lawyer or the doctor for he had a greater range of problems to meet and solve. He moved that an Agricultural Society and Farmers' Institute be formed. The motion was seconded and carried.
