GLAZE FOR FRUIT PIE

1 cup boiling water 1 package jelly powder 1 cup fruit juice Dissolve jelly powder in fruit juice and boiling water. When slightly congealed pour over fruit in a pie and chill thoroughly. Apple or cranberry jelly may be melted down and poured over fruit and used for glaze, if desired. However avoid using jellies that have been made up with commercial pectin.
