ST. LAWRENCE DISASTERS.

From the days of confederation and long before down to the present time there has been a perpetual cry for more money to improve the St. Lawrence route and the canal system of Quebec and Ontario. Money has been poured out like water for these purposes, and the public treasury reaps no return. But commerce has been aided, inland traffic developed and the general progress of the country promoted. By continual dredging it has been made possible for the great ocean steamers to reach Montreal.

But it cannot be denied that as a shipping route the river St. Lawrence has been productive of many disasters in past years which have made the marine underwriters very chary of taking further risks in that quarter. This in turn has been made the imperative reason for spending more money to further improve the St. Lawrence channel. And with all these expenditures and improvements the season now closing has been regrettably one of the worst in the history of this great waterway.

Five serious disasters have occurred during the past season, culminating in the total loss of the Bavarian, which next

to the new turbines was one of the finest of the Allan fleet. Earlier in the season the turbine ship Victorian went aground and the Leyland liner Virginian went ashore the same day with worse results. Two or three weeks ago a serious collision occurred between a Hamburg-American packet and a Norwegian steamer. No doubt it is quite possible for such a series of marine disasters to occur anywhere, but on the river St. Lawrence in the Province of Quebec there is an antiquated pilotage system, a close corporation of pilots, who are believed in some instances at least to be careless or incompetent or both. This is a phase of the situation that seems to require immediate and energetic attention by the Government. It is idle to go on spending millions to improve the channel if pilots are permitted to ply their calling who are incompetent and constantly sending the most costly steamships to almost certain destruction.

A correspondent writes The Guardian calling attention to the continued violation of the Scott Act in Wellington, where he states three rum shops have been running night and day without interference and with much resulting drunkenness. "It is no uncommon sight," he writes, "to see a dozen men and boys under the influence of liquor, and travellers say they hate to stop over night there as they cannot get a peaceful sleep on account of the rowdiness." This matter requires the immediate attention of the Prosecutor, who seems to have so far neglected Wellington that our correspondent says no one knows him even by name. Come now, Mr. Prosecutor, do your duty.

An Ottawa despatch to The Patriot intimates that the resignation of Mr. Justice Nesbitt was made with the expectation of his being chosen hereafter to succeed R. L. Borden as leader of the federal Opposition. This may or may not be true. It is beyond question, that with admittedly fair abilities and high character, Mr. Borden has failed to satisfy the expectations of his party. His acceptance of a large salary in connection with the leadership has disappointed many and disgusted not a few, and made his retirement a necessity whenever a suitable successor can be found. Mr. Borden would be the last man to retain the leadership over a dissatisfied party. He accepted the position reluctantly, and is no doubt quite willing to give it up at any time when the party so desires. Whether Mr. Nesbitt, or any other man in sight would make a better or more successful leader for the Conservative party than Mr. Borden remains to be demonstrated.

GOOD ROADS.

We were shown yesterday the work of what is known as the Ontario Road Scraper on the Mount Edward Road. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, having seen its usefulness in the Niagara district some years ago, had one made and has had it in use during the past season. One horse does the work. The scraper is attached to a truck or cart. Its operation produces a perfectly smooth, well-rounded road bed. Yesterday it was used on that road and we would advise our Road Overseers to have a look at the result.

There is no unseemly ridge of clay piled up in the centre of the road, but the whole surface is left smooth and even. The machine can be set at any angle and so clean out gutters or level the centre track. Better still, its cost is under ten dollars, and the machine might easily be used on every road as it is in Ontario, whenever rains begin to show themselves. There the practice is to have one of these scrapers for every six or eight miles. A farmer attaches it to his truck wagon and half a day's work does half that distance, and whenever it needs it the work is gone over. It is needless to say that their roads are kept in almost perfect order and they are justly proud of them. Our soft roads make this machine particularly adapted to use in this Province, and as we should have a like ambition we hope to see many of these scrapers in use next season.

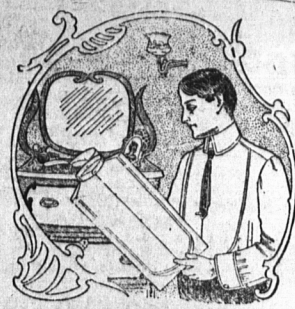

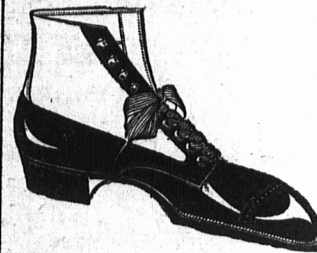
