The Dining Room and Its Furnishings.

With good taste and unerring judgment in the selection of wall coverings and furniture it is really a very simple problem to successfully furnish a dining-room.

Cheerfulness in the dining-room should be considered, and whenever possible a dining-room should have a sunny exposure and plenty of light. Red is very attractive for certain rooms when the furniture is of Finnish oak or other dark wood, although it is to be avoided with mahogany, as it is not enough of the contrast to this richly covered wood.

Green covering on the wall when there is mahogany furniture is charming unless the room is unusually dark. Mahogany is probably the most desirable wood to be had for dining-room furnishings. Very charming rooms are seen where the furniture is in mission oak or the Finnish oak, both of which are dark in coloring.

One reason that a dining-room is not difficult to furnish is that it requires fewer pieces than almost any other apartment. The pieces chosen should be few and in harmony with one another. A dining table, side-board, serving table and the requisite number of chairs are all that are really required.

A hardwood floor is almost a necessity in the dining-room, and there should be a soft, thick rug almost covering the floor. The pictures for the dining-room should be few and well chosen, and simply framed in dark wood. Copies of old English hunting scenes or pictures of a similar nature are particularly appropriate.

Proper ventilation is a most important consideration, and heavy draperies and window curtains should be avoided. Some of the newest curtains for dining-rooms or living-rooms are of grass cloth or madras decorated with a stenciled border, repeating the colors of the room.

The artificial lighting of the dining-room is of great importance, and artistic lighting has much to do with the charm of any dining-room. Gas as an illuminant should be avoided if possible. Then, too, it is almost impossible to secure gas fixtures that will be in harmony with the decorative features of the room.

Electricity besides being so much cleaner, gives a soft, becoming light and electricians can be had to combine perfectly with the scheme of decoration.

Recipes for Homemade Cakes and Cookies.

Almond Strips.—Mix one-half a pound of flour and one-half a cupful of milk, one and one-half ounces of butter, juice of a lemon and sugar to taste. Stir on the fire for 10 minutes, take off and add the

beaten yolks of four eggs and two table-spoonfuls of chopped almonds. Pour into a pan and bake. Cut into strips and dust with sugar.

Spice Cookies.—Mix two eggs, two cupfuls of brown sugar, one-half a cupful of butter, one-half a cupful of

one teaspoonful of chopped cloves, one each of grated nutmeg and soda, melted in water, and of cinnamon. Beat all well, add enough water to make a stiff paste and roll out thin. Cut in rounds and bake in a hot oven.

Plain Cookies.—Cream together three-quarters of a pound of butter and one pound of sugar, add one pound of flour, one teaspoonful of powdered cinnamon and one-quarter pint of milk. Roll out very thin, cut in rounds and bake one-half hour.

Gingerbread.—Beat four eggs, add one-half a grated nutmeg, six pounded cloves, two ounces of candied peel chopped fine, eight ounces of sugar; mix all 14 minutes, add slowly one-half pound of flour, a pinch of salt and a tea-spoonful of baking powder, then eight ounces of chopped sweet almonds. Stir all well, pour into this one-half inch deep. Bake one-half hour in a modern oven, top with chocolate and cut into slices or strips.

Butter Cakes.—Sift three pounds of flour, add two cupfuls of sugar, seven eggs well beaten, zest of one lemon, one-half pint of milk and one-half pound of melted butter. Mix the butter with the sugar, add the eggs, then the milk and flour. Beat all well, spread on buttered pans and set to rise. Butter the tops, dust with sugar, cinnamon and chopped nuts, prick with a fork here and there, and bake till done. Serve hot, cut in slices for lunch or tea.
