for the perpetuation of righteousness and liberty, for the furtherance of the plan of the Eternal God for the development of humanity and for the dawning of that glorious day when we shall see ushered in a lasting and a permanent peace.

Tonight we specially seek to honour those who have nobly laid down their lives. We remember with sorrow, yet with just pride, that Canada to-day is poorer in men but infinitely richer in heroes.

You know how the press of every part of the British Empire has been ringing with the plaudits of the men from our own Dominion who played so brave a part. We may have lost 160 men; they are buried there in Flanders; but though far from their loved ones, though far from the land they claim as their own, they are still with us, and they must ever remain with us.

To-night we lay on their graves our tribute of admiration and affection, our appreciation of their undaunted courage, their unflinching zeal, their noble faith in the righteousness of the cause for which they died.

Dr Fullerton then appealed to his congregation to pray for the gallant soldiers of the Dominion and of the Empire, prayer for the sick and wounded prisoners, prayer for the suffering, prayer for the dying.

The service was an expectant one.

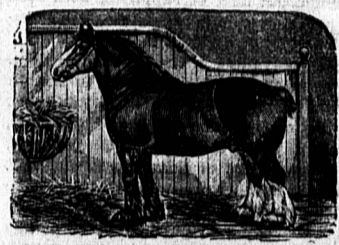
