CONTROLLING THE ARMY WORM.

When the army worm appears in a crop, crops in adjacent fields may be protected from its ravages by the following: 1. Crops adjacent to badly infested fields may be protected from invasion by the use of a barrier, such as a ditch or a deep furrow with its perpendicular side toward the field to be protected. If the army worms are abundant, holes about two feet in depth should be made in the bottom of the furrow at a distance of 15 to 20 feet. The caterpillars fall into the ditch, crawl along it, and soon collect in these holes, where they can be readily crushed or destroyed by applications of oil or other gelseferious materials. Ditches or furrows should be watched to keep the side near the crop smooth and perpendicular and the depression from being bridged over by the accumulated bodies of caterpillars.

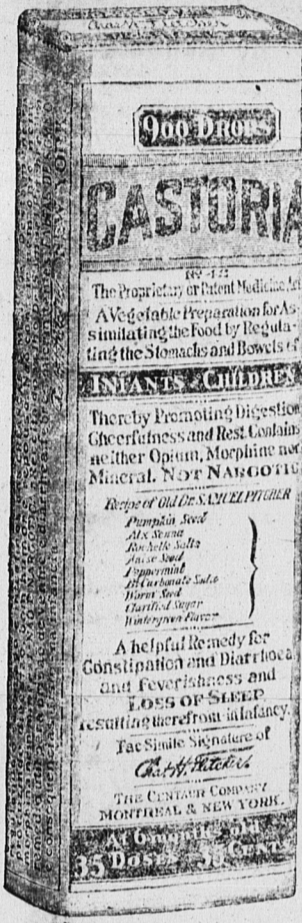
