Exports for the week totalled 9,554 beef cattle, 380 dairy and 3-120 calves. Exports from April 1st to 16th, under the best quarterly quota amount to 20,166 head. Shipments from January 1st to April 16th, with corresponding figures for 1941 in brackets, amount to: beef cattle 67,756 (28,303); dairy 4,822 (3,779); calves 16,836 (13,940).

Calves Mostly Steady There was little change in the calf market and Toronto continued to pay \$14 to \$15 for choice veals. While Montreal lost 25 cents at the beginning of the week on common to medium veals this was later regained. Good veals were fairly steady at \$12 with tops to \$12.50 and an odd \$13. Winnipeg was unchanged with best veals \$11 to \$12.50 and the high price at Edmonton and Regina was \$11.25. Moose Jaw \$10 and Saskatoon \$11.50.

Hog Prices Continue Steady Hog prices again continued mostly unchanged with Toronto paying \$15.15 for the basic grade dressed, while Montreal was on a basis of \$15.25 to \$15.40 but closed mostly at \$15.25. Winnipeg held its previous level of \$14 to \$14.10 and Calgary was mostly \$13.75 with one load \$13.85. Edmonton was steady at \$13.75, to \$14.25, Moose Jaw \$13.75, Regina also \$13.75, Saskatoon \$13.60 to \$13.75, Vancouver \$14.75 and Moncton \$15.25. Lamb Market Steady Sheep and lamb prices continued on an even keel with Toronto paying \$12.75 for best quality lambs and Montreal selling a few aged lambs up to \$10. A small supply at Winnipeg sold up to \$11.50, while Calgary paid as high as \$11 and Edmonton quoted \$10 to \$11. Tourist Accommodation for this Summer GENERAL TRAVEL INFORMATION

We again intend to issue a booklet giving information regarding Places to Stay on Prince Edward Island. Forms to be filled in and returned to us are being mailed to all those whose names were listed last year. If you intend to offer accommodation during the summer months and were not listed last year will you kindly write us immediately and the necessary forms will be sent you. We can only list the names and particulars of those who actually complete the forms. Even if listed last year it is necessary for you to send us the form for this year if you wish your name included.

From present indications, based on the number of inquiries being received and other information, we believe that the tourist prospects for Prince Edward Island this year are fairly good.

GENERAL INFORMATION. Owing to so many rumors being circulated regarding transportation, which have no foundation in fact, we urgently request you when writing to your friends to get the facts. The following information is the latest we have received from government and travel sources:—

AUTOMOBILES. American tourists when entering Canada, if staying for a period of over forty-eight hours, receive a permit for twenty units of gasoline, which on the present basis of five gallons to the unit equals one hundred gallons of gasoline. On the ordinary automobile this allows approximately 1,800 miles for driving. We have been informed that there are large numbers of automobiles still with good tires on them, also that some people from the United States are doubling up on their automobile trips and two families coming in one car. Write this information to your friends.

BY RAIL. Our latest official information is that United States citizens will be free to travel to any part of the North American continent. There are no restrictions on rail travel in Canada. We expect heavy rail traffic to Prince Edward Island from the Maritimes, Quebec and Ontario. The special twenty-one day excursion rates will be in effect from June 14th to September 1st from Port Arthur east. The through daily Pullman service between Charlottetown and Montreal has been resumed. This Pullman at present leaves Montreal on the "Maritime Express" at noon. When the summer timetable goes into effect on May 25th it will leave Montreal every evening, except Saturday, on the "Ocean Limited". The Pullman leaves here every morning, except Sunday, at 7.00 a.m. Connections from Summerside and West are made at Emerald Junction. This is a splendid service and we ask you to give it as much publicity as possible.

AIR SERVICE. The Maritime Central Airways is providing a splendid twice daily service from Charlottetown and Summerside to Moncton and Saint John. Connections are made at Moncton with the Trans-Canada Airlines for Halifax, Montreal and points West, and from Moncton to Boston via Northwest Airlines, connecting at Boston and New York with American Airlines to all points. This service is becoming increasingly popular.

BUS SERVICE. We have been informed that SMT bus service on Prince Edward Island will be the same as last year with a few minor schedule changes. Improved Sunday bus service will be in effect. Other local bus services, we understand, will be resumed as usual. Bus connections to the mainland will be the same as last year. There will be two daily bus services to and from Boston and Saint John during the summer months.

WOOD ISLANDS FERRY. This splendid service will be resumed May 1st with some slight schedule changes. The S. S. "Prince Nova" during the winter months was put in excellent shape for the summer service.
