**Secretary's Report**

"We have held a total of 13 meetings commencing Sept. 23, 1947 to date with an average attendance of 34 members. This in an increase of 6 over last year but this is due to the fact that the four meetings that were held in the schools included 100 per cent teachers and many parents. At the meeting in West Kent School 130 people were present.

"Auxiliary teachers in all three schools gave an excellent report of progress made with backward pupils.

"All principals were enthusiastic regarding the installation of school radios and considered that much enjoyment was obtained by the pupils.

"Miss Harrington who had taught at a school in Trinidad talked of her experiences to a group at West Kent School. Mr. Barlow, manual training teacher at Queen Square spoke and displayed work made by the boys. Rochford Square School had an interesting meeting, when Dr. Plewes, National Director for Physical Fitness spoke. A display of sewing and weaving was much admired. Mr. Shaw, Deputy Minister for Education was at this meeting and said that much had been done to give education an impetus that had been lacking for some time.

"During the visit to Prince Street School, members inspected the class rooms and took special interest in the Auxiliary teachers room.

"A meeting followed in the City Hall as it was hoped to encourage the teachers and the public to take part in our discussions. Dr. Doney, National Director of First Aid spoke on this occasion and statistics were given regarding the percentage of accidents on highways and in the homes. It was decided by vote at this meeting that Thursday be retained for the regular league meeting.

"The next meeting was held again in Queen Square School and Mr. Clarence Mercer was the guest speaker. Fathers were invited to this meeting and there was a large attendance. Mr. Mercer emphasized that the schools' job was to provide a firm guidance and a social background. A plea was expressed for Technical Schools to run parallel with our High Schools.

"At a meeting in January, Dr. A. E. Murchison gave interesting facts and figures regarding mental deficiency, and his advice was appreciated by members. The recently formed Child Development Committee with Mrs. Roy Smallman as chairman are making progress. The Women's Institute and the Catholic Women's League are co-operating.

"A pantry sale was held in January resulting in a satisfactory sum being raised.

"Mrs. Julian Herring spoke in February, on Successful Women's Clubs and League members were agreed that we were fortunate to have her knowledge allied to our group.

"Mrs. J. G. Patterson was speaker at the next meeting and her subject, Voice Control for children resulted in a general discussion on children's habits and training.

"At the Charlottetown Art Centre in April, Miss Frances Johnston, Art Director, talked enthusiastically on Art for Prince Edward Island. There was 40 per cent more response here than anywhere else to her knowledge.

"The final guest speaker for this year was Col. L. MacDonald, principal of Queen Square School. His subject was The Pre-School Child and members listened intently. True education was not merely an acquisition of knowledge it must overflow into activity and should teach the laws of absolute trust, said Col. MacDonald, also that manners do not make or mar the man they reveal him. The views expressed were for same education and applicable to every child of pre-school age.

"Mrs. Gordon MacDonall, chairman of the High School Committee conducted a High School "Quiz" programme at the meeting on April 29th and it was most helpful and instructive to all members. Mrs. MacDonall is to be congratulated on the work and preparation of the programme.

"Two rummage sales were arranged although it was regretted that one would have to be held after this meeting.

"This concludes the secretaries report for the year ending May 13th, 1948 and I would like to say how very much I regret relinquishing the office of secretary but with the Guide duties that I have undertaken it proves too much to handle efficiently. I have enjoyed working with Mrs. Lantz, our competent president also with the co-operative executives and thank them all very sincerely for the help that has been given during my term of office."

There were five carlots exported from the Province last week with additional smaller shipments moving to Newfoundland and Maritime points. Quality continues good but with hens out on range picking up a lot of green food, look out for Grade B eggs due to discoloured yolks. Hens confined daily until three p.m., fed well, then let outside, will not pick up sufficient green feed to discolor yolks. There has been no change in prices and grading station operators continue to quote for ungraded eggs AL 47-38, AM 36-36, B 28-31, C 18-20. Dealers are offering for the regular graded pack AL 42, AM 40; B 36, and for A large and A medium stamined, sized and packed for export 1-1-2c a dozen more. Wholesalers are quoting retailers for the graded pack in cartons A Large 48, A Medium 48, B 40 and retailers are selling this carton pack to consumers AL 55-55, AM 51-53, B 47.

Poultry market is dull with only a few broilers being offered.

**Fall Poultry Prospects**

Feed prices are leveling out and laying pullets are sure of a high egg market this fall, while heavy chicken will certainly be in short supply this fall. With chick sales down so much below last season, there will not be enough pullets this fall to lay the eggs in the high price season. Island poultrymen might be well advised to study the reports of high grain crop yields which are coming in from many quarters, low chick sales, and prospective higher prices this fall and winter for poultry products. It is generally believed that purchases of baby chicks this spring will cash in this fall on very good profits.

A message from Mr. W. A. Brown, assistant director of poultry marketing and production services, states the outlook for market poultry is very promising. The United States market continues strong. One large evaporating plant which shipped chicken to Switzerland earlier has new orders for larger quantities than can be filled. The Canadian poultry trade is also prospecting new methods for more effective consumer approach on poultry meat. Apparently producers from their own summary of the situation are now more interested in chickens for meat than they were earlier in the season.

**Encouraging Progress Reported On New "Y"**

Last evening the Charlottetown Y's men held their regular weekly supper meeting in the Masonic Temple banquet room. 43 members and guests were present. The meeting opened with the singing of "O Canada," after which Y's Man Rev. J. D. Davison asked blessing. Supper was served by the members of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Y. M. C. A.

Regional Director Roy Graham of Moncton, N. B., Club, who is paying his official visit to Charlottetown, was in attendance and presented the international convention to be held in Long Beach, California, in August of this year. He also advised that the 1949 convention would be held in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and in all probability would be sponsored by the Maritime Region. It was decided that the Club should be represented at the Long Beach Convention, and later in the evening President Walter Cox was unanimously selected as the Club's delegate.

In attendance were three guest speakers, Mr. Frank Tinney, president of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A.; Y's Man Roy Cudmore, chairman of the Y. M. C. A. Building Fund; and Y's Man Jim McConnell, General Secretary of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A.

Introducing the speakers in turn, President Walter Cox paid warm tribute to these men for their untiring efforts in carrying out their executive duties, in connection with the construction of the new Y. M. C. A. building on the corners of Prince and Euston Streets.

Cites Old Reports

Mr. Tinney remarked, "if we look over old reports we find record of agitation for a new "Y" Building dating back at least to the early nineteen hundreds. Many committees had worked on the problem, but hesitated, because of financial reasons and outlook, to take the plunge. During the war years, with thousands of service personnel passing through our doors, the matter of adequate facilities and equipment became acute."

"In early 1944," he continued, "after serious thought and consideration, it was decided the old building had reached its final stages of usefulness as a Y. M. C. A. Under the guidance and chairmanship of D. J. Bonnell, an appeal was made to the public for funds to erect a new Youth Centre - one designed and equipped to meet modern requirements. The response by the public was most gratifying. Our appeal had been for \$75,000 and this amount was most generously over-subscribed. Apparently, we had the public with us, and the future looked rosy and bright."

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**New Electron Microscope Is Super-sleuth**

**MINNEAPOLIS, May 13** - (AP) - Science's super-sleuth, the electron microscope, has solved a tricky case of mistaken identity involving two rasicals of the germ world, the Society of American Bacteriologists was told today.

The powerful "eyes" of the scope have detected a definite difference between two organisms which look exactly alike under an ordinary microscope-and which have confused some investigators.

The organisms are: The germ that causes syphilis and the germ that causes "pinta"-or "mal de los pintos"-a skin disease that occurs in Mexico and Cuba.

Dr. Juan J. Angulo and colleagues of the University of Havana, and of the Squibb Institute for Medical Research, New Brunswick, N. J., made the report.

They said "pinta" has been regarded by some investigators as a clinical form of syphilis found in the tropics, because of the fact that germs isolated from a patient look just like syphilis germs under a regular microscope.

And yet, they declared, there is both clinical and experimental evidence that "pinta" is a distinct disease.

So they obtained a germ from a Cuban afflicted with pinta-and put the problem up to the "electron microscope."

They found a number of differences in the appearance of the germ, as compared with syphilis germs, and said:

"The possibility of using the electron microscope in the differential diagnosis of syphilis and pinta is suggested by the present results."
