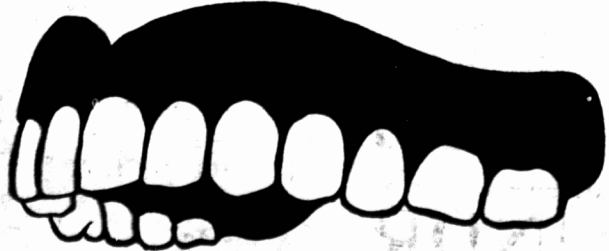

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SECOND QUARTER.  
WORDS AND WORKS OF JESUS AS RECORDED IN THE GOSPELS.

LESSON XII—JUNE 11.  
THE TRANSFIGURATION.

Luke 9: 28-35. Memorize verses 30, 31.  
GOLDEN TEXT.  
This is my beloved Son: hear him.—  
Luke 9: 35.

Time.—Summer, A. D. 28.  
Place.—A spur of Mount Hermon, north east of Galilee.

INTRODUCTION.

Returning from the vicinity of Tyre and Sidon, Jesus, accompanied by his disciples, passed through the region of Decapolis, east and south east of the Sea of Galilee, performing many miracles of healing by the way (Matt. 15: 21-31; Mark 7: 31-37). The great multitudes followed him everywhere, sometimes in their eagerness to hear his words and see his miracles forgetting even the necessity of daily food. It was at this time that the second miracle of feeding a multitude (four thousand) was performed (Matt. 15: 32-39; Mark 8: 1-9). The demand of the Pharisees for a sign from heaven, the healing of the blind man near Bethsaida, and the great confession of Peter, also belong to this general period of the ministry of Jesus. At last the Master was constrained to seek a more secluded spot for rest and for more private communion with his disciples. With this twofold purpose in mind he turned his face northward, and proceeded along less frequented highways to the region of Caesarea Philippi, near the foot of Mount Hermon, on one of the spurs of which we are to think of the transfiguration as having taken place. A foretelling by Jesus of his death and resurrection immediately followed this event.

EXPLANATION.

28. "Eight days after these sayings"—"After six days" (Mark 9: 2). Different expressions designate the period of approximately one week. The sayings referred to are those concerning his impending suffering and death. The week had been spent in the vicinity of Caesarea Philippi, Jesus teaching his disciples in private. "Peter and John and James"—These three, with Andrew, formed the innermost circle of the apostolic group. To them Jesus on several occasions manifested himself more fully than to the others. "Went up into a mountain"—Mount Hermon. Not to the summit of the mountain, however, which was more than 9,000 feet high, but from the valley up to some more secluded retreat on the mountain side. "To pray"—And to grant unto these leaders of the apostolic company a vision of his glory which should sustain them in coming disappointments and sorrow.

29. "The fashion of his countenance was altered"—"His face did shine as the sun" (Matt. 17: 2).

30. "Moses and Elias"—Representatives respectively of "the Law" and "the Prophets." For the subject of their conversation see next verse.

31. Spoke of his decease—or, "de parture" which he should accomplish at Jerusalem.—The cause and manner of his death involved both perfect obedience on his part to God's known will, heretofore never rendered by man, together with the bearing of the utmost penalty of sin in suffering, and the final consummation of the fulfilment of all prophecy relating to the Messiah.

32. "Heavy with sleep"—Not sound asleep, but drowsy, sleepy, and this during the prolonged period of prayer preceding the transfiguration. "Were awake"—Roused by the extraordinary event transpiring so near them and by the sound of strange voices.

33. "As they departed"—About to go. From the following sentence it is plain that Moses and Elias were recognized by the disciples. None will be strangers in heaven. "Not knowing what he said"—Absent-minded, carried away by the rapture of the hour.

34. "While he thus spake there came a cloud"—"A bright cloud" (Matt. 17: 5), similar to the Shechinah, or cloud of glory, which was a symbol of divine presence. (Comp. Exod. 33: 9; 1 Kings 8: 10). The coming of a mere mountain cloud, though heavy, would hardly have occasioned fear on their part.

35. "This is my beloved Son: hear him"—The memory of this Voice and its testimony was to sustain them in the dark hour of disappointment soon to follow.

36. "And when the voice was past"—The voice apparently came after Moses and Elias had departed. "They kept it close"—Until after the resurrection, in accordance with the express command of Jesus, given them as they descended from the mountain. (Comp. Matt. 17: 9).

QUESTIONS ON THE LESSON.

What was the purpose of the transfiguration? Did that purpose have anything to do with the death of Jesus? How related to Old Testament prophecy? Do special seasons of joy and spiritual illumination in our lives have a bearing on future hours of sorrow and sore trial of faith? What bearing when in the glory and divinity of Christ manifested to us? What events immediately succeeded the transfiguration? What event intervened between this and the next lesson?

## Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, if the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
