THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., May 14.—Attributed to a large extent to the scarcity of ocean room, trade in wheat was extra dull today, the few sales at a lower price level. Trade in cash grain on spot was also dull but a small quantity of No. 3 Northern wheat changed hands at 5 1/2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg option.

Oats were steady a small trade was worked at unchanged prices for spring wheat grain. A firm inquiry for the United Kingdom for winter wheat grades went unsatisfied owing to high prices demanded by Ontario shippers. A small business was worked with quotations at yesterday's level.

The steady demand from country buyers for most lines of mill feed continued with a moderate business passing at steady prices. The movement for standard grades of rolled oats was strong.

Owing to the fact that the export market has moved freely on the market, unchanged prices ruled in the majority. In spite of increased supplies the egg market tone remained firm. A good trade was worked in jobbing circles. Receipts of butter were 3,413 packages, compared with 2,020 last Friday, lack of demands held the market easy with prices declining slightly, cheese receipts totalled 4,847 boxes, against 2,093, the same day last week, a strong feeling held the market quiet. Small offers resulted in a steady market for potatoes and a fair business. The tone of the maple produce market was steady but scarcity of demand kept trading quiet.

LAST NIGHT'S EVANGELISTIC SERVICES

At the Central Christian Church—Evangelist Hamilton Preached on the Necessity of Repentance.

The service last night began with hymn singing led by Mr. Woodruff. Hymns "Wonderful Peace" and "Where the Gates Swing Outward Never," "Rock of Ages." While the beautiful and impressive service of baptism was carried out, five candidates being buried with their Lord in baptism. The evening service then began with the singing of "Blessed Assurance" in the hearty manner usual to these meetings. One beautiful feature of this service was the singing in solo form by three little girls, the chorus being taken by the young people trained by Bro. Woodruff. This was followed by the audience heartily singing three of the well known hymns, "Revive us Again," "In the Sweet Bye and Bye," and "Nearer My God to Thee." A number then led in prayer asking for a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit and for the conversion of many more to accept Christ.

After the offering had been taken a solo "He will not let me Fall" was very effectively rendered by Mr. Woodruff. Then took for the Scripture Lesson, John chap. 12:48 "He that rejecteth me and receiveth not my words hath one that judgeth him."

Starting out with the vital truth—the fundamental doctrine of repentance—"Except ye also repent ye shall all likewise perish." Give up the decision that you can live in your own way. By repentance clinging only to Jesus Christ. Every one has his or her own besetting sin. Never stop to compare your own sins with other people's sins. Recognize the universality of sin. Except you repent you shall all likewise perish. Citing the case of the sinful woman with Jesus her Lord, he quoted the words of Jesus: "He that is without sin cast the first stone," then Jesus turning to her said: "Go and sin no more." Let us come to Christ because of our sin. There is just one way to come to Christ feeling a sincere need for pardon.

Who is repentance? Can you explain it? Children cannot be expected to explain it. But what about the grey-headed elder or deacon or the would-be critic of children not knowing what it meant by accepting Christ. Suffer the little children to come unto me. What is repentance? If I had a blackboard, mind, heart and love. The Bible says "As a man thinketh in his heart so is he." The Bible says "Love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy mind." After comparing these with the statement of psychology. He again quoted the Bible as written in Daniel, "Turn, as Daniel purposed (determined) or will do in his heart. Repentance means a change of heart, resulting in implicit obedience. God commanded men everywhere to repent. Adherence only is never safe. Any sin that keeps any man or woman from accepting Christ is sure to damn him in the end. Repent, turn, dare to take Christ for his way—He will surely save. God can save the man of eighty but even He cannot save his wasted life. How important for the young mind and life to be consecrated to a life of service. Come, confess, repent. Do not stain your life and the lives of others by remaining in your sin. Come to Christ. Citing a very touching story of a man in the Australian army who told how after an angry scene with his father he had left his home and became a stowaway in a ship. Crossing the ocean, and after living a life of sin for four years, he became sick. Consulting a physician he was told that his disease was such that he could not live; he then said "Doctor, I must go home." The Doctor remonstrated and told him he could never reach home. "Doctor," he said, "I'm going home, I'm going home." He carried out his resolve, reached home and met his father and mother. A touching scene took place and the wayward son pleaded for forgiveness of those who had loved him with a tender love notwithstanding his absence and silence for four long years.

Sinner, you have wandered far from God. Let Jesus Christ be the rock of Gibraltar on which you can place your trust. At the conclusion, tonight take Jesus as your Lord and Master. An invitation song was then sung and two—a young man in the prime of life and a girl in her teens, made the good confession that Jesus is the Christ the Son of the Living God. Meeting then closed with the benediction.

book, the speaker continued, but why had it not been reported to the Magistrate. Councillor Hennessey attacked most severely a dance hall on Great George St., saying that the noise coming from there, coupled with the blasphemous language uttered by "hangers on" has forced mother living nearby to move their children's sleeping quarters to some other parts of the houses. And not only this inconvenience but citizens are complaining of numbers "squirring" tobacco juice at their very feet and passing remarks as they go by. He suggested that the police attend more strictly to their duty in this respect. The speaker made reference to our local "speed merchants" who travel so fast they don't know where they are going half the time adding that someone will be killed if the police do not round these automobile freaks up, and sundry. He scored the police patrol system, saying that at present the officers at no time can be found on the four corners of the city, their beat being Queen to Water thence to Great George and down Grafton—very few other sections are covered. And if something is not done and right away somebody is going to pay for the negligence.

Councillor Hennessey dwelt at great length on his department and concluding stated that if each and every member of the force do not discharge their duty properly he would present a resolution at the next meeting with reference to the suspension of any one or more officers taking same.

His Worship replying to the Chairman of the Police Committee said that he Mr. Hennessey in his report made an admission himself that he was not doing his duty as well as could be expected and went on to instruct his listener on the procedure necessary to be taken in making his reports to the Marshall. BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows: 1. Every non-resident of the City who engages in or does any transient work or labor therein must obtain a license therefor and shall be subject to a license fee of three dollars, said license will be issued by the City Clerk and will remain effective until the thirty-first day of December following the issue thereof. The said license fee must be paid and license obtained before or immediately on such non-resident beginning such transient work or labor in the City as aforesaid PROVIDED, however, if any such non-resident shall be at the time of beginning such transient work or labor assessed in respect of real estate in the City actually owned by him to an amount exceeding five dollars, then in any such case the City Clerk shall issue such license without requiring any such license fee therefor. 2. Any person offending against the provisions of this by-law shall be liable upon summary conviction thereof before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the City of Charlottetown to a fine of not more than fifty dollars together with costs, and in default of payment thereof the said Magistrate may commit the offender to imprisonment in the Common Jail of Queens County for a period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said fine and costs be sooner paid. A By-Law Relating to Dance Halls and Places of Public Amusement BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows: 1. That every dance hall or other place of public amusement in the City wherein an admission fee, whether by cash, ticket, membership or otherwise is charged shall hereafter be required to obtain a license from the Mayor therefor, such license to be granted in the absolute discretion of the Mayor on satisfactory proof to him that the premises wherein such dance hall or other place of amusement is conducted is sanitary, orderly and not liable to be a nuisance to or create disorder in the neighborhood and also reasonably secure in respect to structural safety, fire protection and provisions for exit. 2. Every dance hall or place of public amusement shall close promptly at twelve o'clock at night and on Saturday night of each week at eleven thirty o'clock, and shall be absolutely closed on Sunday. 3. Any church, society or other body operating solely for benevolent, patriotic or charitable purposes shall be exempt from the provisions of this by-law. 4. Any license under this by-law may be cancelled by the Mayor on complaint, with the right however to the City Council to overrule his decision and make such other order in the matter as the City Council may deem right and just. A By-Law Amending By-Law Chapter XXII of the City of Charlottetown. BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1. Any person purchasing coal, coke, wood or other fuel by weight from any dealer within or without the City limits to be delivered by horse team or auto truck in the City, shall have the right to have the same weighed on the City scales provided that such purchaser pays extra truckage, delivering and returning as with regard to the deviation of route may be reasonable and proper.
