A NUMBER of readers doubt the credibility of THE GUARDIAN's article of a few weeks ago stating that Mrs. Eljah Saunders of Winsloe had dislodged a tree about five inches long from her throat. LITTLE YORK circuit is not behind in having the seed of the kingdom ably, patiently and earnestly sown, as any reasonable thinking person would have thought who was privileged to hear the sermon in Un on Road Church on the 2nd inst. Taking for his text Rom. XIX 1st and 2nd. "We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak and not to please ourselves. Let every one of us so please his neighbor for his good to edification, for even Christ pleased not himself." the pastor sent home to all hearts the sentiments and truths his devoted life so nobly exemplify. First viewing the great need of living out that great precept, he showed the immediate change that would necessarily follow if the rule were universal; then from examples, first from the lower animal kingdom, of instances of devotion to their master, versus the wild animal nature when removed from gentler influences, again following the same thought into the human family, he particularly noted how far away is the mere animal propensity from any thought of self-denial. From history we have illustrations of the directly opposite tendency in the destruction of the weaker in the great arena, and the evident pleasure manifested in viewing the struggle for the survival of the fittest, and again the complete annihilation of the ten thousand slaves by the same cruel Roman nation. Again in viewing the time-worn maxim "Live and let live," we were shown how far behind the spirit of "let live" if agreed with our comfort, but if not, at all events live. Against the dark background of unnatural selfishness was placed the spotless purity of that life given up for us. Against the pomp of brutal and worldly minded monarchs was placed the humility of Him, who when supper was ended took the basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, thus giving force to that precept, which he saw was so hard to impress on the human heart, viz., the thought of being servant to all. As we have taken on us, as a nation, that name "Christian," so let us, each one, draw near to the great centre from which radiate the direct rays of pure unselfishness. A review of the language of the heathen nations shows the utter absence of the word "unselfish," as the examination of the lives shows the train of evils which are the direct result of the lack of this precept in the human heart. May the determination of complete surrender for the benefit of others, in the breast of each hearer and reader be quickened, as is that of ONE WHO HEARD.

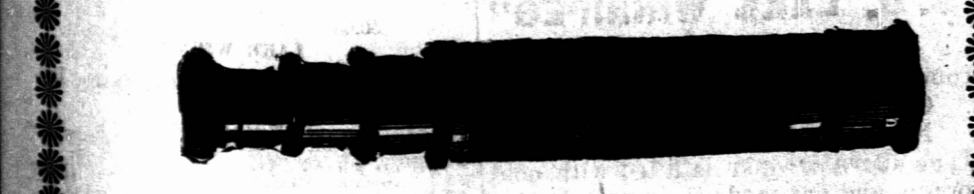
