**The Subconscious Mind**  
Says Dr. Bowers:  
The mental function has a powerful influence upon the function and the quality of sleep. This, in turn, depends largely upon one's ability to put the objective mind in a quiescent condition and give the job of running things over to the care of the subconscious mind. The "objective mind," it will be remembered, is that mind which takes note of everything that happens to us when we are awake, getting all its impressions through the avenues of sight, smell, hearing, touch and taste.

**SCIENCE EXPLORES THE REALMS OF SLEEP**  
We now have it on the authority of a scientist Dr. Edwin F. Bowers of New York, that of all things, sleep is the most vital. A man can go without food or water for a long period. Men have had fractured necks and have lived. Bullets have even pierced the heart without fatal results; but if a man gets no sleep for ten days he either dies or goes insane. Scientific interest in the phenomenon of sleep appears to have been stimulated by Freud's theories regarding dreams, but while Freud undertakes to understand all about dreams, investigators are by no means agreed concerning sleep. They differ as to what causes it, any why it is necessary. There are quite half a dozen theories each with respectable exponents, but the one that Dr. Bowers speaks of with most approval is what is called the chemical theory. This is to the effect that while one is awake the expenditure of this is greater than the rebuilding process, but that while one sleeps, nature takes her opportunity to restore what has been expended. So the best theory appears to be the one that Shakespeare had in mind when he spoke of sleep as nature's "sweet restorer."

**Light and Sound Sleepers.**  
But it is unwise to dogmatize about hours. A great deal depends upon the quality of the sleep, for there is good sleep and sleep that is not so good. The real sound sleep is the best. This is defined as the sleep that is untroubled by dreams. The light sleeper is the dreamer, or rather the sleeper who remembers dreaming, for even the science, though they may have no recollection of it. The subconscious mind never sleeps and it is the subconscious mind that one dreams with. One curiosity of the subconscious mind is mentioned by the author. He notes that tired doc-

**CLASSICS AND INDUSTRY**  
(Vancouver Province)  
Some wag has said of the Englishman that he spends the seven best years of his life learning the dead languages and the rest of it in forgetting them. It happens that the annual meeting of the Classical Association, the session of which are being held this week at Cambridge, follows with only a fortnight's interval upon the issue of the report of Lord Crewe's committee, which was appointed by the Prime Minister to consider the place of the classics in our educational system. The president of the association is a striking example of the classical scholar and successful man of affairs. After taking a high degree, Dr. Leaf went into the banking business, and is one of the leading authorities on finance in this country. During his address, Dr. Leaf gave an amusing account of how, during the war, he and several of his brother directors of the London Electrical Railway, had a long discussion in the board room on a passage of Thucydides, which seemed to one of them appropriate to the circumstances of the time. A point of interest in the evidence taken before the Crewe committee was the attitude of the labor leaders who were unanimous for the teaching of the classics, on the ground that the "average worker must attain a wider outlook on the problems with which the country will be faced." The usual argument against the classical education is that it is impractical; but the mental discipline that goes to the making of a classical scholar broadens and disciplines the mind for all mental work, and the conducting of a large commercial undertaking requires just those qualities. Success in the world is to those who understand the world; and those who best understand it are those who know something of its past and who have grasped something of the splendor of its origins.

**CLASSICS IN AFFAIRS**
