POINTED SUGGESTIONS. By Rev. D. W. Sayer.

Playing at heroics is not quite the same as being heroic. Indeed, it is another thing altogether. Heroism failed to exhibit any true kingly quality. As children playing "school" place the emphasis upon the scolding authority of the teacher, so the thought of heroism was satisfied with the exercise of the despotic, but despotism begets revolution.

Resourcefulness is a quality to be admired if it operates within the limits of the worthy and honorable without the corruption of morals or the overthrow of piety. The political trickery of Jeroboam exceeded all that. He made Israel to sin. His name, therefore, is branded.

Out-and-out for God was evidently the intention of Ahab's heart; for it was perfect with the Lord for all his days. Though he made some tactical blunders and failed to accomplish a full programme of good, the record of his righteousness with God shines. Guard the heart.

Progress is a good thing to notice if you are satisfied whether it is tending. Making progress in sin and in measures for greater sin in the fore-runner of destruction. Omri and Ahab had constructive genius, but destructive character. Which wins out?

He truly prospers who is obedient to God's commands. Josaphat and his reign are proof of this.

Elijah the Prophet is the massive and heroic figure in the series of lessons under review. But he was bird-like and widow-kept. His spirituality was his greatness.

Tests of faith, which mean also contests with ungodliness and idolatry, are always in order. Whenever the Church of Christ makes believing appeal to the God that answers by fire, the successors of the priests of Baal vanish.

Overwrought nerves are sure to report themselves. Happy are those in that condition who are met by a sympathy and a method of cure as certain of healing results as in the case of Elijah. What a tender yet faithful Physician God is! His choice prescriptions are sleep, food, work and trust.

Freedom to follow one's inclinations or to grasp whatever the covetous heart may crave would work ruin. That is the larger liberty which rejoices in the rights of others. When Jezebel plotted murder she had to reckon with a judgment to come.

God buries His workmen, but carries on His work. Is that true? The spirit of Elijah rested on Elisha, but Elijah was not buried. Does God ever bury? What does Jesus mean, "Whoever liveth and believeth on me shall never die?"

Only son. That fact becomes the father of a great and sympathetic tenderness. The love that is human is honored of God. He knows where He laid the heart-strings. He is the God of all comfort and the Father of mercies. Elisha demonstrated it.

Depart from evil and do no good. And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess, but be filled with the Spirit.

BOSTON, Mar. 14—As last the secret of why Boston's best prominent men keep on looking so well is out. They have hobbies. That's the answer.

"Have a hobby and keep healthy," is the dictum of Dr. Carlos McDonald, the noted New York specialist in mental diseases, and the fact that ailments in many noted court cases don't affect his qualifications as an expert on hobbies.

"A good hobby is of the greatest assistance to physical and mental balance," says Dr. McDonald. "I have known of cases where in a worn-out melancholia or neurasthenia were restored to perfect health by giving themselves up to their favorite hobbies."

"True for Dr. McDonald," echo in chorus many of Boston's best-known men, who all have hobbies, some two or three.

Bear in mind, little children, that a hobby is not a fad. A fad, while it seems respects not unlike a hobby, has not the permanence of the latter. It is more evanescent and does not require the mental concentration of the hobby. Caught early in life the hobby is easily domesticated and quickly becomes a pet. The hobby quickly responds to kind treatment and as Dr. McDonald says often helps its master.

FAVORABLE TO ANNEXATION.

MONTREAL, Que., March 14—That the Bahamas Islands had definitely declared for annexation to Canada was announced here this morning. P. B. McAulay, managing director of the Sun Life Insurance Company, who spent the greater part of the winter in the Islands working for the union of the two colonies, this morning received a cablegram from Lorenzo G. Price in the Bahamas stating that a resolution asking the Canadian government to enter into negotiations, with a view to the final annexation of the Islands, was carried by the legislature by a vote of 22 to 5. The sentiment in the islands is reported by Mr. McAulay to be very strongly in favor of annexation.

FOUR RISK LIVES TO SAVE BOY

COHASSET, Mar. 13—In the rescue of Howard Sullivan, 11, son of Mrs. Mary Sullivan of this town, who fell through the ice into Cluff River this afternoon, Miss Mary Bethel, 18, and her father, James Bethel, narrowly escaped drowning.

Joseph R. Frates and Foster Cadoss, edging along the ice in a boat toward the drowning boy, broke through the ice and were overturned several times before they finally succeeded in reaching Sullivan and getting him onto dry land.

Both were exhausted by the struggle and in great danger. Young Sullivan was crossing Gulf river near Bryant's Point when he broke through. His cries for help were heard by James Bethel, who started out on the ice but broke through.

When the daughter, who had followed her father to the edge of the ice saw him in danger of drowning she forgot the treacherous ice and ran to help him to safety.

When just about to seize his hand the ice broke beneath her, and father and daughter, each striving to keep the other from going down, were nearly lost before they felt ground under their feet and waded to the bank in safety.

Sullivan, the cause of the narrow escapes from drowning, was taken by Cadoss and Frates to his home, where after medical attendance and a sleep he was little the worse for his wetting.

Miss Bethel late tonight was far from recovered from her experience.

WHEN TO SHAKE HANDS.

When to shake hands is a subject which depends on circumstances, but a few general rules may be given. When a man is introduced to a lady, she does not shake hands with him unless he is distinguished or a great deal older than herself. If he is the husband or brother of the lady making the introduction, it is natural to receive him cordially by shaking hands; but it is not usual to do so if he is a mere acquaintance.

A hostess should shake hands with all the guests who come at her house, both on their arrival and departure. Women do not shake hands when introduced to each other, but merely bow. When, however, a young girl is presented by a friend to a married woman, the latter generally shakes hands with her, but the girl should not make the first advance.

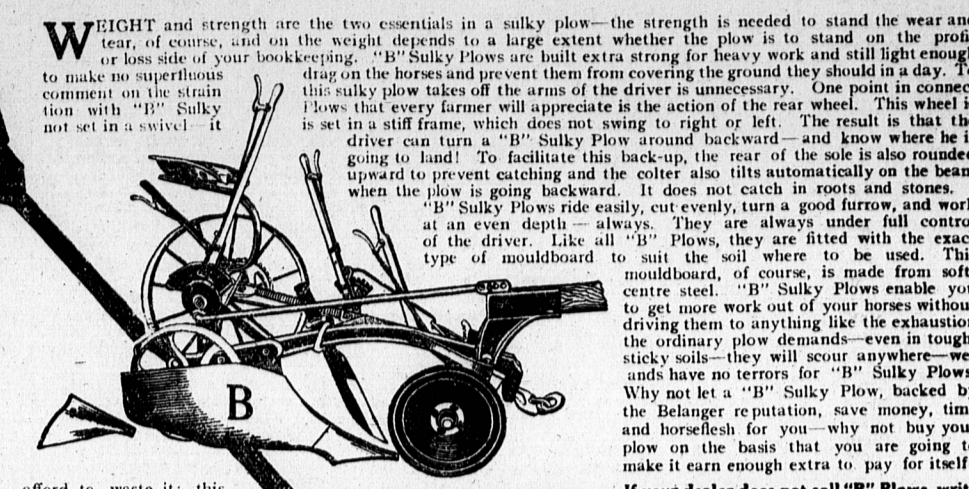
