The entertainment which was to have taken place at St. Eleanor's on Wednesday evening for a charitable purpose and postponed on account of the severity of the weather was held last evening and attended by a good many young people who went by team from Summerside.

Three sudden deaths occurred in this Province on Wednesday. Besides the death of Mr. Phillips, Charlottetown reported in this paper yesterday and Jabez Burrows, Kensington chronicled elsewhere in today's issue, word comes from Indian River of the sudden demise of Miss Kate Campbell which occurred at that place on Wednesday afternoon. Miss Campbell, who resided with her brother John Campbell was sitting by the fire when she suddenly dropped a corpse. Deceased had been up to the time of death in apparent good health. She was about forty one years of age.

The sudden death of Jabez Burrows of Kensington on Wednesday was a sad blow to the many friends of deceased, who was a popular and respected resident of that place. Deceased who lived a short distance from the village was on his way to the drug store to procure medicine for his wife who was ill when death overtook him. He had been in his usual health on the day previous and his demise came quite unexpectedly. His lifeless body was found about nine o'clock by the mail courier on the road near the Episcopal church. Heart trouble is believed to have been the cause of death. Deceased was seventy one years of age and leaves to mourn a widow and one child seven years of age. Mrs. John Waite of Bedouque is a sister. W. T. Burrows, Summerside, a nephew and Miss Katherine Burrows, Summerside a niece of deceased.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

LETTER FROM MR. HYNES.

SIR—I read a letter in The Guardian dated Jan. 22 by John Anderson in connection with the Kensington School. Mr. Anderson has omitted many essential points that the public in general might wish to hear and his letter in many instances gives wrong impressions being misleading and untruthful. Mr. Anderson did not tell that there was a committee of six appointed the day of the annual meeting who were to assist the trustees in superintending the building of the new school. Mr. Anderson asked to give the committee equal power and authority in looking after the building of a new school, the work being supposed to be left entirely with the committee and trustees. Here we differed in opinions. Mr. Anderson and Mr. Moase determined to carry out their propositions against a majority of our trustees and resorted to many mean and unprincipled actions which was what I might expect of such men knowing their past record.

Mr. Anderson accuses Mr. Kennedy and myself of obstructing the work, etc., and a new school. This is absolutely untrue, Mr. Kennedy being always favorable towards the building of a new school. True I opposed at first but I was agreed with the majority of rate-payers which cannot be said of Mr. Anderson; who was determined to carry out his propositions independent of finance, law or order, both in school matters and all other enterprises which he ever undertook to lead for the good of society. As to his dismay in this case, when we differed in opinion. Mr. Anderson and Mr. Moase were running school matters to their own satisfaction without consulting me and endeavored to have me dismissed from the Board of Trustees by giving the Inspector untruthful charges contained in Mr. Anderson's so-called Round Robin, which he appears to be familiar with. From Mr. Anderson's letter one would infer there was an investigation by the Inspector previous to my dismissal. This is untrue from the fact that there never was an investigation of the charges upon which I was dismissed.

I wish the reader to bear in mind that there are not 140 rate-payers and that a large number of them are non residents who do not take any interest in our school matters.

At a public meeting of the rate-payers a petition to the Board of Education for my reinstatement was signed by over 50 rate-payers and who asked Mr. Anderson and Moase for their resignation from the Kensington School Board. The reader would again infer that I had my reinstatement before the committee was appointed made the investigation, this being untrue. The Board of Education upon receiving our petition demanding an investigation of my dismissal appointed a committee composed of Messrs. Robertson, Wheat and Simpson, who, I believe, came here unprejudiced and open minded to get the facts as near as possible in regard to the perpetrated outrage. Making no decision in the case, as stated in Mr. Anderson's letter, but submitted their report of the investigation to the Board of Education who could not knowingly and justly do otherwise than reinstate me in my former position.

Mr. Anderson and Mr. Moase give the impression that they will resign as Trustees. This threat has been a customary one by those officials when matters are against them. However our interests will be better served, as there are a number of rate-payers who are quite competent of taking charge of our education in this district, and men who would not be so mean as to try and drag party politics into school matters.

Regarding Nature Study work which he accused me of being opposed to, I am an enthusiastically in favor of it as he (Mr. Anderson) and presume I can help to carry it on as well as the so-called promot-

er, Mr. Anderson. Those nine years of his trusteeship are due to the fact that many rate-payers took but little part in school matters until his glaring actions called for a halt.

Now Mr. Editor, I would not have noticed his letter had he stated facts and not tried to impress on some, that I created this disturbance he speaks of in the school district. I always try to work for the interest of fair play and justice. I may say here I am supported by a majority of rate payers who denounced Mr. Anderson's actions in a meeting by strong resolutions.

Now as things are settled I would think Mr. Anderson would have time to attend to his own affairs, and other further correspondence with him will be treated with silent contempt.
