COAL FAMINE IN CHICAGO IS SERIOUS

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—With the closing of thousands of loss essential industries throwing 200,000 men out of work, and the adoption of a six and a half hour business day by stores and office buildings. Chicago today felt the first practical effects of the coal famine. Theatres are limited to evening performances and one matinee a week and service of local transportation lines and suburban roads have been curtailed to the minimum requirements. More industries will be closed each day as their small supplies of fuel are exhausted

third, under an order issued today by T. S. Eustis, chairman of passenger system on these roads. A similar order will be issued in a few days applying to eastern and southern roads.
