Montague Is Acclaimed One Of Finest, Richest Of Dominion's Towns

The following is taken from the Halifax Herald of a recent issue. "Comparisons are very often made between towns and communities in the extreme east of Canada and those in the western provinces. Much is written and spoken of 'the progressiveness, the breeziness and the community spirit of the golden west, of model towns and villages' until the phraseology has become hackneyed. Down in Kings county lies Montague, perched astride a small river in a setting as fairytale as the illustration in a Hans Anderson story book. Montague's population is less than 900 and its prosperity and hustle, prospects and general well-being are a complete denial of the too easily accepted statement that western Canadian communities have a lien on these attributes.

PRODUCE

MONTREAL, Sept. 18.—Cheese sold at an unexpectedly high price over the week end at country boards. At Belleville a price of 11 1/4 cents paid, while others generally were around 10 1/2 cents. Keen competition was shown for the cheese which were the first of the September production. Cheese made in September is regarded as excellent for keeping and generally superior to the output during the better months of July and August. The Montreal cheese market ended the week at 10 1/2 to 10 3/4 cents for Ontario's, and 10 1/2 to 10 3/4 cents for Quebec's, but, following the higher prices paid over the week end, a sharp advance is scheduled tomorrow. Exports of cheese last week from Montreal were 39,976 boxes, a reduction from the previous week when 56,008 boxes were shipped. The exportations to date are 531,487 boxes, against 518,700 boxes at the same time last year. Cheese receipts are shrinking, totalling last week only 29,508 boxes, against 32,708 boxes a week ago, and 37,301 a year ago. The butter market last week held at the recent advances and was generally about 2 1/2 for carlots for L. C. sold higher and some stored stock sold lower. Receipts last week increased a little, totalling 11,223 boxes, against 10,544 a week ago. Small lots of retailers are quoted by week, becoming mostly 60c per 50 lbs. tubs and 70c per bag for New Brunswick cobbles.

It is today, one of the finest and richest towns of its size in all Canada. Its history is as romantic as its present progress is impressive, for two centuries ago it was part of a large area known as Three Rivers, on which settlements were made by the French. A company from France headed by De Roma was granted trading and fishing rights and ships carrying natives of Breton were soon placed in the colony. This occurred in 1731 and the main settlement was established at Brudenell Point in what is now known as Georgetown harbor. De Roma's company of adventurers seem to have made great strides in the cultivation of the soil and all went well until 1645. A British warship appeared off the coast in that year on June 20, landed a body of men and completely destroyed De Roma's headquarters and buildings in the surrounding settlements. Three Rivers as a colony ceased to exist thereafter and for many years the territory was abandoned. It was not until 1784 that several hundred United Empire Loyalists, in flight from New York, carved homes out of the virgin forest where Montague now stands. The descendants of these are numbered among those who have made Montague what it is today.
