THE STANLEY.

The demands of the spring trade render it important that every facility shall be offered for transportation between the Island and the mainland at this season. It is also of the utmost consequence to the trade of this port and of the entire Island, and especially to our merchants and business men here, that the navigation between Charlottetown and Pictou should be opened at the earliest possible date. For weeks past our people have been paying the extra ten cents per barrel for transporting their freight over the railway between this city and Georgetown. This money goes to swell the railway receipts, no doubt, but that affords no excuse for forcing the traffic to the Georgetown route for a single day after the direct route becomes practicable.

It would be useless to attempt to disguise the fact that a large and intelligent section of this community believe that no effort was made to open the way to Charlottetown from the sea for days after the route had become practicable. The fact that the Princess, which is not at all equipped for ice-breaking, made her way out, and actually opened the navigation before the Stanley entered, or attempted to enter this port, tends to confirm these persons in their opinions.

The fact that the Stanley entered this port last year some weeks earlier than this year, would not of itself prove anything, but it adds to the reasons why the inactivity of the winter steamer in regard to coming hither should be further explained. And then there is the other fact of the sudden and surprising activity of the steamer in making the round trip from Georgetown to Pictou and back again on Sunday last. These circumstances taken together have created the disagreeable impression in many minds that the public interest has not been so powerful as individual and party interests in directing the Stanley's movements.

THE GUARDIAN has shown on many occasions its friendly interest in the Stanley and her able commander, and has so frequently and heartily commended their work that we feel confident we will not be suspected by any one of harboring a feeling of hostility or a desire to be unduly critical. But we do think that the circumstances above pointed out call for an explanation such as may, if possible, relieve the public mind of its present unpleasant impressions. The Patriot endeavors to shield the Minister of Marine at the expense of the agent and the captain, together with the weak condition of the boat. This will hardly satisfy the general public.

There seems to have been a reaction against woman suffrage in New Brunswick, judged by the vote on Hon. Mr. Emmerson's resolution, mentioned a few days since in these columns. The resolution declaring in favor of equal voting privileges for both sexes only received seven votes in its favor while more than four times as many were recorded against it. This in a new house fresh from the people must be rather discouraging to the equal suffragists.

APRIL 23. JESUS, THE WAY AND THE TRUTH AND THE LIFE.

John 14. 1-14. LESSON HYMN. Upon the cross of Calvary The Lamb of God we see; Oh, sing it very softly: He died for you and me.

GOLDEN TEXT. Jesus said unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life.—John 14. 6.

OUTLINE. 1. The House, v. 1-3. 2. The Way, v. 4-6. 3. The Father, v. 7-14.

Time.—Thursday evening, April 6, A. D. 30. Place.—Jerusalem.

LESSON HELPS. "Let not your heart be troubled."—Because of the near departure of Christ and of the conduct of the betrayer. That ye may not be troubled, "believe in God," which is the proper rendering. It is a command. In a sense every Jew believed in God. That truth was to the Jew often a mere form, but the reality was needed, and with it the power and the life. "Believe also in me."—As a living expression of the love of God for those who receive. Happy are they who thus believe; for to such the heart is untroubled. 2. "In my Father's house"—Heaven, the home of God, the throne of his power. "Many mansions" or abiding places, and for many souls, for there is abundance of room. Nothing is said here about whether the mansions vary in glory. There may be degrees of happiness hereafter. 3—"I go to prepare a place for you"—A prepared place, and it is for a pre-

pared people. The purpose of Christ's departure is made clear. The future presence of Christ and believers are made manifest. "I will come again."—Various meanings are given to the coming again of Christ. The Revised Version has "I come again." The words seem to refer, as in verse 18, to his spiritual presence then and now, though they may include also the second advent.

4. "The way ye know"—Though not so clearly as they ought to have known it. There is a slight rebuke here.

5. "How can we know the way."—Dulness yet honesty in the mind of Thomas. He thought of the earthly Jerusalem and not of the heavenly. The feeling of the early disciples was that the Messiah would reign as an earthly king.

6. "I am the way"—The pronoun I is emphatic; the way is that by which the soul comes to God. "The truth"—For Christ is the divine word, and "the life," for Christ is one with the living Father, and the Giver of life. "I am come that they might have life"

7. "If ye had known me"—By spiritual perception, known in and by the heart, and not the intellect only. To know God in and through Christ should be the aim of all.

8. "It sufficeth us"—He wants to see God with the eye, or at least some vision of him like that which came to Moses. "The pure in the heart shall see God," and only they can see him. To such the sight is satisfying.

9. "Hast thou not known me"—Gradual was the knowledge of Christ to his disciples. Not until Pentecost were their eyes fully opened.

11. "Believe me for the very works' sake"—The miracle were a ground for belief, but a more satisfying ground to us is the inward experience.

12. "Greater works than these shall he do"—See Matt. 21. 21-22. These works are not miracles, but refer to the scenes at Pentecost and the victories of Christian truth over Judaism and paganism.
