## Four Teams To Comprise City Hockey League

Saint Dunstan's, Prince of Wales, Navy and Legion will comprise the clubs competing in this year's City Hockey League as was announced at a meeting of the officials held last night in the Canadian Legion home and which was presided over by league president Samuel F. Doyle.

Matters such as the drawing up of a schedule, referees, goal judges, practice hours and other things incidental to the successful running of the league were discussed at length and will be finally decided upon at a meeting being called for next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Legion Home.

The following rules to govern the league were adopted at last night's meeting:

1. Number of players to dress for each game not to exceed fifteen including a spare goal tender.
2. Any player after playing one league game with any club, shall be deemed a member of that club and may not turn out with any other club unless being granted a release in writing.
3. Each club is to be allowed a limit of 20 players.
4. No club to be allowed any players after Jan. 15, 1947, except for exhibition games. College teams (P.W.C. and S.D.U.) may draw from their student bodies at any time.
5. All protests to the league executive shall be in writing and accompanied by a cheque for \$25.00, cheque to be returned if protest is allowed and to be forfeited if protest should be disallowed.
6. The league executive will be the final authority in all matters pertaining to the City League.
7. M.A.H.A. rule book to apply.
8. Referees to be appointed by the league executive.
9. Two referees to each game.
10. Goal judges to be appointed by the league executive independent of the league teams entirely.
11. Games shall consist of three 20-minute periods with time out for all stoppages of play. No league games to be played in November.

## Confident Of Again Beating Montgomery

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 19 — (AP)—"Challenger Wesley Mounzon is 'back of hearing' that his knockout victory over lightweight king Bob Montgomery was just a stroke of luck and vows he'll prove it—this time with the chips down.

Next Tuesday's 15-round bout here "won't be any different" from last August's engagement, Mounzon said confidently today, except that Montgomery, Pennsylvania's New York version lightweight crown will be at stake.

Quoth Mounzon: "I'll knock him out again because I know I have the stuff to do it. People give me credit for being a better boxer but said I couldn't and couldn't take it. I didn't have to prove I could take it from Bob the last time but I did show 'em I could hit."

On the eve of the fighters' check-up before the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission, Mounzon remarked at his Bateville, N. J. training camp that he was "fed up" with reports Montgomery is complaining he was "caught cold" the last time because he rushed into the ring early and had no opportunity to warm up.

## Horse Prices Remain High At Fall Sales

LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 19 — (CP)—Blossom Lane, a seven-year-old bay mare sold for \$15,000 here today as bidding vaulted at the afternoon session of the Keeneland Fall Sales.

The mare, imported Bul Dog—Cherry Lane, was purchased by Charles E. Nelson and consigned by John W. Donaldson to the box.

Seventy four horses, most of them mares, were sold for \$276,700, an average of \$3,729.

The top-selling bid of the afternoon sale was \$13,000 which Woodville Farm offered for Blue Stockings, a 10-year-old brown mare by the late Larkspur Fly right. The consignor was A.G.C. Sage.

## Freddie Mills Not Good Enough For Heavyweights

LONDON, Nov. 19 — (CP)—Any British sports fan will doff his hat to Freddie Mills. But the tribute will be to the enormous tune of the Fumeral March if the battle-browed British-light-heavyweight champion continues to stray in the top-weight class.

Freddie, a courageous battler and the answer to any fight promoter's prayer, is the "pin-up" boy to those folks who like blood-and-thunder boxing. However, legalized mayhem one especially (84) to 23 guinea (88) throw is too much for any body—especially when Freddie's blood is spilled.

After three drag-em-out fights within six months, all against men with weight, height and reach advantages, even Freddie's staunchest admirers have come to the reluctant conclusion he isn't good enough for the heavyweights.

Mills, who did his wartime fighting in the R.A.F., bounced back into civvy street this year, adjusted to the "big" crowd in the light-heavyweight crop. There were no British prospects.

Promoter Jack Solomons came to the rescue. He signed Freddie to a five-fight deal with the National Boxing Association announced today that the New Hampshire State Athletic Commission has joined the N.B.A.

## Boxing Manager Sued For \$5,000

MONTREAL, Nov. 19 — (CP)—An action for \$5,000 against a boxing manager in connection with the death of her son following a boxing match in Quebec City has been filed in superior court by Mrs. Raoul Guenette.

The mother claims that the manager, Lucien Audette, was at fault in allowing her son, who fought under the name of Roland Prairie, to fight too soon after an earlier bout in Montreal, which she contends left him in a weakened condition.

The 18-year-old boxer died in hospital a few hours after a fight last August against Kid Point of Quebec.

## Desmarais Recaptures New England Title

MANCHESTER, N. F., Nov. 19 — (AP)—Florent Desmarais of Manchester, tonight recaptured the New England lightweight boxing title in a 12-round bout from Tommy Greb of Boston, who defeated Desmarais in a Boston ring six weeks ago.

Desmarais weighed 134 1/2 and Greb 135.

In an extremely close contest the two southpaws alternated in attacking and in the eighth and ninth rounds both seemed on the verge of being knocked out, but neither could deliver the payoff wallop.

## IN THE CORNER

Local hockey fans may have a glimpse of City Hockey League warfare on December 3rd if plans formulated at the City League meeting last night come to a head. It will likely be Saint Dunstan's pitted against Prince of Wales and if the game does come off it should certainly start the season off with a bang.

With four clubs again being definite starters this coming season should prove to be on a par with previous ones. With a large exodus of the players being noted to other Maritime Provinces and the fact that hockey here for this coming season was being dealt a body blow, but since that time newcomers have appeared on the horizon and right now it looks as if four evenly balanced squads with again be battling it out for league honors.

And there shouldn't be any lack of playing material for this year's City Hockey League schedule judging by the turnout of players at P.W.C. and Legion practice sessions held at the Forum yesterday.

At both workouts Coaches Johnny Squarbriggs and Gordon Drilon had over two dozen players on deck, and it will not be surprising if battles for positions on each squad will transform into closely-fought struggles.

Prince of Wales, last year's champions, and Legion, runners-up to the Welshmen on that occasion, both have plenty of gaps to fill in their ranks but the quality of the newcomers is such that neither coach is expecting any undue difficulty in this regard.

Presence of Drillon, former N.H.L. scoring ace in his player-manager role with the Legion, should boost that team's stock considerably. The big winger will add a lot of experience and ability to the lineup and his experience gained while playing in the pro ranks will stand him in good stead when he starts teaching the finer points of the game to the newcomers who will make their appearance this season.

"Snag" can be depended upon to turn out another good year for the Prince of Wales Welshmen. He has proven his worth as a hockey coach many times in the past and usually Squarbriggs-coached outfits will make their appearance this season.

And while on the subject of hockey, Manager Charlie Archer, starting his 19th year at the helm of the Forum, gave us the following information on hockey practices for the season.

Practices will start on the hour at the following basis: There will be 45 minutes of actual hockey practice, the other 15 minutes of the hour will be utilized to clean the ice after each team finishes; the following team will have scraped ice to start off with.

Team managers and coaches will be responsible to assure that his team stays off the ice until the signal bell rings, and also that his team leaves the ice at the conclusion of his 45 minutes practice.

There will be no hockey practices or hockey games between February 10th and 15th inclusive, owing to the Dominion curling bonspiel taking place here. The rink management will do everything possible to satisfy the teams using the ice but conditions beyond our control, such as plant troubles, weather, etc., must be considered by the teams when it is necessary to move an hour ahead or back or even cancel the hour.

## Truro's Playing Coach Signs With Providence

TRURO, N. S., Nov. 19 — (CP)—Cliff Roach, playing coach of Truro Bearcats of the Maritime Big Five Hockey League and the circuit's leading point-scorer, has signed a one-year, \$4,000 contract with Providence Reds of the American Hockey League. It was announced tonight.

Roach, who centred Lou Medynski and Billy MacInyre on Truro's first string line, is a son of Mickey Roach of Sydney, N.S., former member of the now defunct New York Americans of the National Hockey League.

In his first six games in the Big Five this season Roach scored four goals and assisted in 14 others to put himself at the top of the scoring list.

Monday's game here between Truro and United Services was scored by Tony Savage of the Reds, who said he was in town to cast an eye on just one player. He was Roach he was casting it at.

Roach said he would leave Truro for Providence Thursday.

## Billy Taylor Leads In N.H.L. Fourth Week

MONTREAL, Nov. 19 — National Hockey League statistics released today showed Billy Taylor, fleet forward of Detroit Red Wings, the league's leading point-maker for the fourth straight week.

Taylor added a goal and an assist this week to run his total to 18 points, made up of six goals and 12 assists. Maurice Richard of Montreal Canadiens is in the second slot with 16 points accumulated from 10 goals and six assists. Another Detroit player, Frankie Brimsek, has turned in two shutouts while Bill Durnan of Canadiens and Broda have one each.

Kenny Reardon, Canadiens' aggressive defenceman, leads the penalty parade with 29 minutes spent in the cooler while Hal Jackson of Detroit is right behind him with 27 minutes in the box.

Toronto Maple Leafs are atop the league standings with 17 points made up of seven wins, three ties and one loss. Canadiens are in the second spot with 15 points, two more than the third place Boston Bruins.
