An auction sale of miscellaneous household goods which was to have taken place in Mr. J. F. Carter's auction room Friday afternoon was stopped by the authorities it being contrary to by-law passed to the view to the protection of local trade. The by-law in question prohibits the shipping to Summerside of goods to be sold by auction in competition with goods of a similar class offered for sale in the stores.

Death has again visited a Summerside home, removing a beloved wife and mother. Mrs. William T. Burrows after a lingering illness, passed peacefully to her rest about one o'clock Saturday morning. She was a daughter of the late Mr. James Hall of Traveller's Rest, and was loved and esteemed by all who knew her. She leaves a sorrowing husband three sons, two of whom are in the U. S. and one a little boy at home and five daughters, Miss Mabel, teacher in Summerside school, Miss Celia, Edna, Amy, and Constance. She was 47 years of age. To the bereaved family THE GUARDIAN extends its deepest sympathy.

A VERY interesting meeting was held in Y. M. C. A. Hall, Friday evening, for the purpose of considering the Temperance interest of the town. Rev. E. J. Grant was appointed chairman and Mr. G. M. Reid, Sec'y. The meeting was a large and representative one, most of the leading citizens being present. Stirring speeches were made by the chairman, Messrs. Wm. McMurdo, John Mollison, Rev. W. H. Smith, Messrs G. W. Warren, R. H. Campbell, J. M. Clark, L. Morris, J. A. Brace, Coun. Allen, Neil Sinclair and others. It was freely admitted by all that the C. T. A. was not being enforced as it should be in Summerside. The town council was pretty severely criticised by many of the speakers, while citizens generally were blamed for apathy and indifference in this matter. It was argued that as the Council had been elected to enforce all the laws, and had voluntarily taken a solemn obligation to do so, their obvious duty was to see that the C. T. A. as well as other laws were enforced and that they should not require to be prompted by citizens. It was also pointed out that the Temperance sentiment of the town was in the habit of getting an annual airing, at some such gathering as the present one, but on election day citizens were guided by their political rather than their temperance sentiments for the remedying of which evils many suggestions were offered. Mr. J. B. Russ moved, seconded by Mr. J. A. Brace, that a number of persons be appointed by the different churches to appoint a committee to consider the temperance interests of the town. Mr. Wm. McMurdo moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. A. S. McKay that a Citizen's League be organized to promote the temperance and moral sentiment of the town. On motion the amendment was carried. Accordingly a committee of three was appointed to draw up a basis of organization and to report at an adjourned meeting in the Baptist Church next Friday evening at the close of the regular prayer meeting. The members of the committee are Messrs G. M. Reid, J. M. Clark, and J. A. Brace.
