Henderson was elected chairman and in a brief speech he introduced Mr. Duncan Marshall who spent an hour discussing the question of Prohibition and explaining the Hundred Thousand vote movement. His address was listened to with the closest attention throughout. Short speeches were made at the close of the meeting by Messrs B. Balderston, John B. Edwards and Adam Brown. The pledge was signed by a splendid list of electors at the close of the meeting.

A SPLENDID audience greeted Mr. Duncan Marshall at his prohibition meeting in Murray Harbor on Friday evening. The chair was occupied by Mr. Alex. McDonald. For over an hour, Mr. Marshall discussed the 100,000 vote movement and its application to the promotion of the cause of prohibition; the audience giving the best of attention. Brief addresses were also made by Rev. Ewen Gillis, Rev. Mr. Matthews, Mr. Richard Murray and Hon. Senator Prowse, all of whom urged the necessity of practical action on the part of the prohibitionists and commended the present move as a good means of organizing the temperance forces. The pledges were largely signed by the electors present, and a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Marshall for his practical and interesting presentation of the question.
