NEW RATE FOR WIRELESS MESSAGE.

MINISTER OF RAILWAYS IS RETURNING.

OTTAWA, August 30—Hon. Frank Cochrane is nearing civilization on his way home by sea from Port Nelson.

BOY KILLED FATHER.

VINELAND, N. J., Sept. 3—E. R. Garton, a liveryman, of this place, was stabbed to death in a fight in his home. Four hours afterward the man's son, Henry Garton, surrendered to the police.

Garton had been drinking heavily and when he reached home he started to quarrel with his wife. Finally, according to the story told by mother and son, he went into the kitchen. He returned with a knife and attacked his wife. The son ran into the room, grappled with his father and disarmed him. The father caught the boy about the neck and forced him backward across the edge of a table. The youth struck at his father's face and neck with both hands and not having released the hold on the knife the weapon was driven into the throat of the elder man. He died in a few minutes.

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDES MOON ETC

The lowest temperature recorded yesterday was fifty-seven degrees above zero and the highest was sixty-two above. The lowest recorded the previous night was fifty-three above.

The sun sets this evening at 5.34 and tomorrow at 6.32; it will rise tomorrow morning at 5.25 and today at 5.26.

The moon rises tonight at 10.18. There was a full moon on Tuesday, Aug. 27th, at 3.59 p. m.

The last quarter of the moon will be on Wednesday, Sept. 4th at 9.23 p. m.

The length of today will be thirteen hours and ten minutes. It was Monday's weather temperature, tides, moon, etc, which appeared yesterday.
