THE OFFICIAL STATEMENT SENT OUT BY GOVERNMENT. At the conclusion of the conference the following official statement was issued:

Acting on representations made to the railway companies by the government, they today empowered Mr. Cloughton and Sir Guy Granet, general manager of the Midland railway, to confer on their behalf with representatives of the trades unions and railway employees, with a view to discussing with them the suggested terms of settlement drafted by the board of trade.

There were present at the conference, Y. H. Cloughton, director of the L. N. W. railway, and Sir Guy Granet, on behalf of the companies; James Henry Thomas, M. P., and Messrs. Bellamy, Williams, Fox, Lowth and Charlton, on behalf of the men, and Mr. Lloyd-George, Sir H. L. Smith and G. K. Askwith on behalf of the board of trade.

Mr. Cloughton stated that upon certain representations by the government he and Sir Guy Granet had the authority of the railway companies to meet the representatives of the men, with a view to discussing terms of an agreement. The terms having been discussed and agreed to, Mr. Cloughton and Sir Guy Granet stated that the recommendations of the men would be accepted by the companies, although they were adverse to the companies' contentions on any question of representation and should the settlement be effected, any traces of ill feeling which might have arisen certainly would be effaced.

Remains of a Man Found by Asylum Attendant About 6.30.

IDENTIFICATION IMPOSSIBLE

While James McInnis, one of the attendants at the Hospital for the Insane at Falconwood, was out shooting in the Asylum Marsh about a half a mile east of the Institution last evening he made a gruesome discovery, when he found the body of a man lying in the grass and seaweed.

Guided by Mr. McInnis they proceeded to the Marsh but owing to the approaching darkness, the treacherous nature of the marsh, over which they were travelling and some slight difficulty on the part of their guide in locating the spot they did not reach the body until after eight o'clock. It was then too late to make a proper examination of the remains and accordingly Undertaker Wright was given instructions as to their removal this morning.

The body was in a very bad state of decomposition and the Coroner states that it may have lain there several months. No thing could be done last night towards identification--only the fact that the remains are those of a man and that they are in a badly decomposed condition are available to this end.

AN INQUEST will be held in the matter, probably tonight, when it is expected that more light will be thrown on the matter.

WILD WEST PICTURE CARDS SEIZED BY THE POLICE

MONTREAL, Aug. 18--The wild west picture post cards which decorated the fronts of various shows on Main street, this morning, underwent the indignity of being arrested this morning and conveyed to the police station in the patrol wagon.

As no other proper place could be found in the police station, unless they were left outside the door, which might detract from the dignity of the building and give it the air of a moving picture show, they were placed in a cell in solitary confinement, where they will be kept until tomorrow morning, when their exhibitors will appear before the recorder.

REV. J. W. MANNING, PRESIDENT OF MARITIME BAPTISTS

BRIDGETOWN, Aug. 19--The sixtieth annual convention of the Maritime Baptist churches of the Maritime Provinces opened its sessions here this morning at ten o'clock with Col. D. J. McLeod Vince, of Woodstock, N. B., the Moderator, in the chair.

The chair appointed as members of the nominating committee, Revs. G. A. Lawson, G. W. Schurman, E. W. Crowell, R. J. Colpitt, H. H. Saunders, Dr. Cousins, J. W. Bancroft, F. H. Beals and N. B. Smith, F. C. Atherton and Rev. Dr. Manning, Dr. Hutchinson, and Dr. A. Cohoon.

At the afternoon session the Rev. J. W. Manning, D. D., of Wolfville, was installed as President of the Convention for the year. He will be assisted by Rev. Dr. Hutchinson, of St. John, first vice-president, and Rev. Osmond Morse, of Summerside, P. E. I., as second vice-president.

Col. B. McLeod Vince on retiring from the office, briefly thanked the Convention for the honor they had done him. The Convention has never had a more efficient presiding officer.

THE FINANCIAL REPORT

The receipts of the Board during the year amounted to \$24,432.89, and the expenditures \$24,113.38. The deficit of \$319.51 is large, however. During the year \$9,300 was spent in the purchase of new buildings at Somport and Vizagapatom. The receipts for the year more than provided for all the ordinary current expenditures. It is of interest to note that the receipts of the Board have increased since 1906 from \$29,936.81 to \$34,000. (Continued on page 3)
