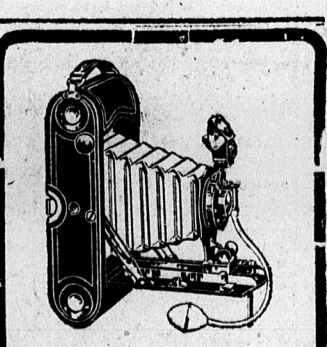

The prices quoted by the wholesalers are:—Potatoes, 60c; pressed hay, \$13; white oats, 55 to 58; black oats, 58 to 50c; pork, 8 1/2 to 10c; straw, \$5.50, and turnpines, 18 to 20.
