S'ide Board Of Trade To Observe 50th Anniversary

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the Summerside Board of Trade, which was formed in 1900. Only one charter member of the original board now survives. Mr. Charles R. Rogers, living in retirement at his home on Central Street, Summerside, in view of the Board's record of fifty years service to the community, it was agreed last evening at the regular meeting of the Board that the annual meeting, which will be held this month, should mark a suitable observance of the date. The tentative date of the annual meeting was set down as January 24th and the matter of attending to the details and the procuring of a guest speaker was left in the hands of the entertainment committee.

Mr. George Key brought to the attention of the Board the necessity for more fire protection for residents living in the vicinity of the oil tanks at the east end of the town, in view of the fire which broke out on Wednesday evening at the office of the Canadian Oil Company. Mr. Key stated that something should be done to give these people more safety.

Mayor J. P. Arnett said that the matter had been taken up last year with the various oil companies and that such precautions as keeping the grass near the tanks plowed down was agreed upon. movement by rail between now and planting time with the possibility of a fair water movement from either Halifax or St. John, or both. It is reported that some potatoes, particularly Mountains, are not keeping as well as might be expected. If this is correct we might have a decided shrink in our present holdings and this, in turn tend to an improvement at a later date.

"We do feel that the present is not a time to be too much price minded, and that potatoes should be moved as every opportunity presents itself. A few weeks ago strong representations were made to Ottawa for a support price on potatoes but no information has been received to this date, whether or not we are likely to secure same.

Turnips

"The turnip market continues satisfactory with the general price 65c at the car, with a fairly firm undertone. We are in excess of 160 cars to date cover what we shipped for the entire season last year. We can see no reason why turnips should go below their price at level. What is needed for a good, strong, healthy market for turnips is cold weather, and that is now long overdue.

Butter

Butter continues to be quoted at the same price on all markets. The post Christmas period has always been a slack period for all goods, and the same is true of butter. The factory price on December 30th was quoted at 63c f.o.b. Halifax, with local jobbing at 65c. On the same date Montreal price was unchanged at 60-14c for No. 1 solids delivered. Toronto 60-34c.

New Brunswick creamery butter quotations are as follows: Creameries to wholesalers, one and two pound flats, 62 1-2c; wholesale to retail stores 64c. We are informed that there are carloads of second grade butter coming on the Sydney market at a price lower than the price delivered from Prince Edward Island creameries. This would be a matter for the Dairy Products Board to adjust by arranging their prices if the necessary information is forwarded to them.
