BRITISH ADVANCE

Toward Peking Will Begin at Once

RUSSIA AT NEWCHWANG

Austrian, Spanish, Italian, and Dutch Legations are Destroyed.

BRITISH FORCES TO ADVANCE.

LONDON July 31.—(Special)—The British forces in China will begin an immediate advance on Peking and expect to have the support of the allies.

RUSSIANS CAPTURE NEW CHWANG.

Japan reports that Russia has captured the New Chwang forts in Manchuria but the Chinese are said to be returning with reinforcements.

VARIOUS LEGATIONS WRECKED.

It is now said that Austrian, Spanish, Italian and Dutch legations at Peking are destroyed and the French partly wrecked.

ENGLISH PROFESSOR MURDERED.

Francis James, an English professor at Peking, has been murdered.

There are 400 non-combatants in the British Legation.

A REFORMER FAVORS THE ALLIES.

Kang Tu Wei, the reform leader, has summoned reformers from all parts of the world to meet at Makow to form an army to assist the allies.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(Special)—The Government has called on the people of Cuba to vote on the third Saturday in September for delegates to meet at Havana on the first Monday in November to frame and adopt a constitution for the island.

KILLED A PILOT IN A PASSION.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 31.—(Special)—Alex. King, 65, a miner has been handed over to the authorities for killing Herbert Davenport, a river pilot from New York who brought him down the Yukon.

COL. HERCHMER'S SUCCESSOR.

OTTAWA, July 31.—(Special)—Major Perry has been appointed Commissioner of Mounted Police in place of Herchmer, superannuated.

REVENUE BOOM—YUKON ROYALTIES.

The Customs revenue for July was \$2,414,771, an increase of \$481,068 over July of last year.

It is said the Government will abolish the Yukon royalty, establish an assay office at Dawson and charge three per cent for assaying, instead of the 10 per cent royalty.

A HORRIBLE TRAGEDY. PRINCE

Proprietor of the Campbell Hotel, Summerside, Shot Dead.

A 32 CALIBRE BULLET ENTERED HIS SKULL

Causing Immediate Death—The Deceased Man's Wife Heard the Fatal Shot and Running into the Hall was Horrified to Find Her Husband's Body Lying on the Floor—Physicians Called, but their Aid was not Needed.

Summerside, July 31.—(Special)—James A. Houghton, proprietor of the Campbell Hotel, Summerside, shot himself this evening about 8 o'clock. The report of the fatal shot started the inmates of the hotel, and Mrs. Houghton running into the front hall was horrified on finding her husband's body lying on the floor.

Policeman Campbell and several others who heard the report on the street ran up the steps. Drs. McPhail and McLellan were sent for and arrived in a few minutes, but the unfortunate man was beyond the need of help. A 32 calibre bullet had penetrated the skull near the temple, and although the heart beat for some minutes his death must have been instantaneous.

Corner Bowness was sent for and an inquest will be held tomorrow morning. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Houghton and her family of little children in the terrible blow that has fallen on them.

They were kindly permitted to have the use of all the outside buildings on the premises as well as the dwelling house now occupied by Mr. Henry Inman and his family to whom the picnic party are indebted for much kindness. After having enjoyed a hearty feast at the dainties, songs, speeches and all manner of games were indulged in. When the day was spent the whole company set out for home by way of Victoria and Craupad and thus availed themselves of one of the finest drives possible on Prince Edward Island. All arrived home about dusk highly pleased over their days outing and resolved to hold their next picnic at Hampton.

PRINCE ALFRED

Duke Saxe Coburg Dies Suddenly

OF HEART PARALYSIS

King Humberts' Death was the Result of an Anarchist Plot.

DEATH OF PRINCE ALFRED.

COBURG, July 31.—(Special)—The Duke of Saxe Coburg died at Rosenau Castle from paralysis of the heart.

He also had cancer of the tongue and his sudden death thus saved him from a painful illness.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS OF HIS LIFE.

Prince Alfred, Ernest Albert, Duke of Edinburgh and second son of Queen Victoria, was born in 1844. Married in 1874, the Grand Duchess Maria of Russia. In 1893 he succeeded his uncle as reigning Duke of Saxe Coburg, Gotha. He leaves four daughters, his only son Alfred having died in February 1899, at the age of 25 years.

ANARCHIST PLOT—MORE ARRESTS.

ROME, July 31.—(Special)—It is now generally believed that King Humbert's assassination was the result of a plot and the anarchists are rejoicing over its success.

Besides Bressia five persons have been arrested at Manza.

A HEART BROKEN WIFE.

It is learned that Bressia leaves a wife, an American, and a young daughter at Paterson, N. J. The wife declares she did not know he was an Anarchist and is heart broken.

THE YOUNG KING HEARS OF THE MURDER.

King Victor Emmanuel Third reached Brindisi today and on hearing the sad news of King Humbert's murder, the young Queen fainted. They left immediately for Manza.

THE YOUNG KING AN ABLE MAN.

NEW YORK, July 31.—(Special)—Ambassador Draper said that King Humbert was very popular with all of his subjects except those opposed to all government and the extreme clericals he adds.

"The heir to the throne the Prince of Naples, is an exceedingly able man, and it is my belief that in his hands the government of Italy, will go on without a break."

A. MELLISH'S LETTER.

SPRINGS, June 19th, 1900.

DEAR CAPTAIN.—Here I am at a big coal mining centre—the terminus of a branch from Elansfontein Junction. The Canadians at present hold this place. It is rather important work as there are several Boer commandoes quite near by. I am in good health, and Small and myself are the only two of our noble 32 who have been able to go through everything to date, with the exception of Gaudet, who is an officers' orderly and Foley who is a pioneer and in the transport. Rodd and Dillon held out well but gave up at Pretoria. At present we have the following Islanders, of the first crowd, with us: Matheson, McKinnon, Gaudet, Small, Brace, McRae, O'Reilly, Foley, and Stewart, Major Weeks, and Rev. T. F. Fullerton.

I had lots of narrow escapes and adventures of all kinds and hope I may soon be home to tell you of them. This is the middle of winter in this country and it is quite frosty at night. Last night I was on out post and slept in a coal dump by a coal mine. Two nights before I was in R. R. Patrol and a couple of niggers shoved six of us on a trolley to Beakfan, eight miles, and back. It was cold and rainy but a soldier does not mind little things like that. Excuse my haste in writing but it is really very hard to get a moment for writing.

HUNTER RESUMES

Hostilities, Being Deceived by Priuzloo

LESS THAN 1,000 MEN

Were Made Prisoners—Canadian Prisoner Released—Another Dead.

THE FIGURES GREATLY CUT DOWN.

Lord Roberts' dispatches to-day show that Generals Priuzloo, Villiers and Crawther surrendered, 986 men, 1433 horses, 955 rifles and a Krupp nine pounder gun.

GEN. HUNTER GETS INSTRUCTIONS.

Priuzloo arranged to surrender his command of 5,000 but as the leaders in the distant hills refuse to come in claiming to be independent of Priuzloo, Lord Roberts ordered Gen. Hunter to resume hostilities and listen to no excuses.

CANADIAN DEAD—PRISONER RELEASED.

OTTAWA, July 31.—(Special)—Sir Alfred Milner reports the death of J. E. Ball of the Mounted Rifles, belonging to Strathcona, N. W. T. of enteric fever.

Private R. Barnside, the Canadian Boer prisoner, has been released.
