BEER PRICES Fixed In Halifax Taverns HALIFAX, Sept. 16.—(CP)—Prices for beer to be sold in hotels and taverns in Nova Scotia were announced here today by Geoffrey Stevens, Liquor Commission administrator.

Included in his statement were provincial fees for hotel dining-room and tavern licenses. Nova Scotians will pay a top of 20 cents a pint for New Brunswick beer and Nova Scotia beer 25 cents for quarts.

Beer brewed in other parts of Canada will sell for 30 cents a pint and 50 cents a quart maximum.

Annual fees for hotel tavern or dining-room licenses will be \$25, payable when the license is issued. A charge of nine cents a gallon will be placed on the first 10,000 gallons bought during the year, with a two-cent-a-gallon increase on each additional 10,000 gallons.

More than 120,000 gallons will be 33 cents a gallon. The same fees will apply for hotel dining-room licenses.

Legislation was passed at the session of the Nova Scotia House to allow open sale of beer and wine if communities voted for it in plebiscites.

Halifax favored such sale by a 20-1 majority and five hotels are selling beer and wine. The steel city of Sydney turned it down while the wets won in most other Cape Breton communities.

Health Plan Adopted By N. S. Medicos

INGONISH, N. S., Sept. 16.—(CP)—The Nova Scotia Medical Society tonight adopted a prepaid medical health plan.

The program was first approved by a majority of the "rank and file" of the membership—about 400 doctors—and was given final endorsement at the society's annual convention here.

Though there was no official comment it was learned that the new set-up had been approved by a majority of the 100 society members at the convention. Results of the balloting were not made public.

The blaze—estimated by fire officials to have caused as much as \$6,000,000 damage—forced the C.N.R. to close the old Bonaventure Station, using it only for a freight terminal.
