BRITAIN IN NEED OF MORE PUBLICITY

LONDON, Dec. 24.—The Prince of Wales, patron of the Travel Association of Great Britain, recited a little jingle at a meeting of the members today: "Early to bed and early to rise—You'll soon be bust if you don't advertise." As soon as Great Britain's situation is straightened out, he told them, Britons will be travelling again just as in normal times. "If we always stay at home and try to eke out a livelihood by taking in each other's washing," he said, "I'm afraid it will be a precarious living for all of us. I have seen what other nations are doing in the way of organized publicity for their commerce and industry. We've got to do the same."

SHOULD SEE RAIMENT OF EARLY PERUVIANS

TORONTO, Dec. 24.—"Those people who think all the early natives of this continent were roughly clad savages should see the array of exquisite raiment received yesterday by the Royal Ontario Museum," Dr. C. T. Curry, director, told The Star today. A few specimens include gorgeously colored and delicate designed clothes of many kinds—costumes, shawls, head dresses and gowns by the Peruvians in the seventh century, A.D. The Peruvians had cotton and banana wool, wonderful dyes, fine looms and weaving tackle, as well as great artists, Dr. Curry said. The new exhibits will not be shown until the opening of the new wing of the museum next spring.

The Pound

The dollar sagged to 15 1/2 cents, a loss of 3/4 of one cent from Wednesday's close.

Culbertson Is Still Winning NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 24.—Ely Culbertson and Ted Lightner early today ended the twelfth session of the big contract bridge match, 14-525 points ahead of Sidney S. Lenz and Oswald Jacoby. They won six of the eight rubbers of the session. The rubber standing became 48 for Culbertson and 38 for Lenz.

BRITAIN NEEDS SEED POTATOES

LONDON, Dec. 24.—An unparalleled seed potato famine is predicted here, and in unofficial quarters the question is being debated whether the time has not come to lift the embargo on Canadian potatoes. The blight is said to be badly affecting last season's short crop, while a serious scarcity of healthy seed potatoes is sending prices up. It is expected the tariff will also intensify the shortage next spring. As a safeguard again the Colorado beetle a complete embargo will be put on French potatoes next March, April, and July, sell cheaply, but the Government's contemplated fifty per cent. duty may prove prohibitive. The Ministry of Agriculture asked why French potatoes are allowed entry till March, notwithstanding the pest is spreading there, reply the beetle hibernates in the ground, and is thus not so likely to spread as in summer. While recognizing Canada has discovered a method of killing the pest, the Ministry is not yet satisfied it is effective. On these grounds it is considered the moment is ripe for a move on the part of Canadian authorities to justify raising the embargo.

Quebec To Increase Its Gasoline Tax

QUEBEC, Que., Dec. 24.—Two important bills were passed in the Quebec legislature this afternoon, one session then adjourning for the holidays, to meet again on January 11. The bill authorizing an increase in the tax on gasoline of one cent, making the new tax six cents a gallon, was adopted after considerable opposition by C. E. Gault, Conservative House leader and Maurice Duplessis, (Cons. Three Rivers). On second reading a vote was taken, the measure being approved 28 to 4. It then carried on third reading. A government bill was passed changing the method whereby cities of 50,000 or over may dismiss their director of services, city treasurers, city controllers, auditors and directors of police. These officers may in future be dismissed only after formal accusation by the city council concerned, a probe by a judge into the charges, a report by the judge to the council and then a vote of three quarters of the council. The new conditions will apply only to the cities of Montreal, Quebec and Verdun, the only cities in the province whose population numbers over 50,000. The measure will go before the legislative council after the holidays. The opposition declared that the bill had been created to serve a particular case, that of the Chief of Police of Montreal. Premier J. A. Taschereau said the object of the bill was to prevent municipal political patronage, whereby aldermen could hold at their mercy officials who might not see eye to eye with them. With the adoption of the bill the officials concerned would be placed in the same status as the provincial auditor who cannot be dismissed without the concurrence of the legislative council and assembly, the Premier declared. A vote was taken, "for the principle of the thing" as Mr. Gault puts it, resulting 26 to 5 in favor of the measure.

NATURE AIDS SHIPPING ICEBERGS STAY IN NORTH

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—Nature gave full cooperation to the Canadian and United States coast guard services this year in combating the hazard of icebergs in trans-Atlantic travel. In the 1931 season, for the first time in 18 years, the icebergs confined their travels to the region north of the Grand Banks off Newfoundland. This was made known in the annual report of the Coast Guard which began patrolling the ice fields soon after the Titanic sank in 1912 from a collision with a mountain of ice. The report, submitted to the United States congress by Rear Admiral F. C. Billard, coast guard commandant, also said his men saved 5,287 persons from peril in the fiscal year ending last June 30.

BESSBOROUGH'S SON IS VILLAIN IN PLAY

OTTAWA, Dec. 24.—Playing the part of Chim Fang, a sinister Oriental villain, Viscount Duncannon, son of the Earl of Bessborough, appeared at the Little Theatre here with a group from the Montreal Repertory Theatre. The setting in the production, a one-act play, "The Cat and the Cherub," by C. B. Fernald, was designed by the Governor-General, who, with the Countess of Bessborough, attended. Viscount Duncannon proved himself possessed of real power for a characterization of the type he assayed, a voiceless pantomime of horror which he gave in the final scene being particularly good.
