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REGULATIONS APPLY TO P. E. ISLAND

Order Provides For Compulsory Inspec- tion of Carload and Carlot Shipments of Potatoes From Pro- vince.

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 12.—A recent
ministerial order under the Root and
Vegetable Act made by the Hon. W.
R. Motherwell, Federal Minister of
Agriculture, provides for the compul-
sory inspection of carload and carlot
shipments of potatoes from the pro-
vince of Prince Edward Island. Prior
to this order the regulations applied
only to New Brunswick.

Provision for this compulsory in-
spection in New Brunswick and
Prince Edward Island has been made
at the request of potato growers and
shippers in the two provinces, and it
is anticipated that as a result of this
action there will be an increased de-
mand for the potatoes grown in these
two provinces from other provinces
and from importers in other coun-
tries.

INCREASE IN IMMIGRATION

(Special to the Guardian)
OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—The volume of
immigration from the British Isles
and preferred countries showed a
strong upward tendency in the last
three months while the influx from
non preferred countries has been
greatly reduced. Between April 1 and
June 30 a total of 77,730 immigrants
came to Canada, an increase of 10
percent over the same months last
year. Of the total immigration 34,987
came from the British Isles, an in-
crease of 46 percent. From the United
States the figure was 11,290, an in-
crease of 21 percent and from
northern European countries 14,498,
an increase of 8 percent.

DEATH OF SIR EDWARD KEMP

(Special To The Guardian)
TORONTO, Aug. 12.—Sir Albert
Edward Kemp, one of Canada's
most prominent and respected sons,
Member of the Canadian Senate and
Minister of Militia and Defence for
a year during the World War, died
at his summer home at Bobcaygeon
early today. He celebrated his 71st
birthday Sunday. Sir Edward's death
occurred at 5 a. m., nearly an hour
after he was stricken. He apparently
had been in excellent health and
only yesterday played golf on his
private links. Lady Kemp and her
daughter were awakened by Sir Ed-
ward when his distress became acute
and they were at his bedside when
the end came. Dr. Kelly of this town
was called, but on his arrival he
found life was extinct and said
death had been caused by an at-
tack of acute indigestion.

and contained no explanation of the
plane's delay in reaching Baker Lake.

Lake for Wager Bay two weeks ago.

Monthly Meeting Of Summerside Town Council

At the regular monthly meeting of
the Summerside town council held
last night His Worship Mayor Lid-
stone and all the councillors, except-
ing Councillor Phillips being present,
bills amounting to the sum of \$18,000
were passed. Resolutions were passed
authorizing the light and power com-
mittee to proceed at once with the
work of installing a new engine at
the plant and to expend what money
was necessary to do so; that electric
light consumers having their services
discontinued be charged one dollar for
reconnection, that a telephone be
placed in the residence of the electric
line man at the town's expense.

A communication from Dr. Farrell

knowing what they were there for
let them walk out.

The matter was discussed at con-
siderable length and on motion of
Councillor Schurman, the town clerk
was ordered to place the information
as given to the council before the
attorney general. After brief reports
of other committees, council adjourned
to meet at the call of the Mayor.

REPORT NEEDS READJUSTING

Ramsay MacDonald Endorses Stand Taken By Philip Snow- den At The Reparations Con- ference.

(Special To The Guardian)
THE HAGUE, Aug. 12.—The Fi-
nancial Committee of the Conference
on Reparations Adjustment again
averred temporarily today the crisis
which faced it with the action on
British proposals for revision of the
Young plan. The committee met to-
day but adjourned soon afterward
until Wednesday, without taking any
action on the resolution for revision
of the Young plan which Rt. Hon.
Philip Snowden, British Chancellor
of the Exchequer, put before it.
Mr. Snowden today made public
the text of a cablegram received by
him from Ramsay MacDonald, British
Premier, endorsing his stand at the
Reparations Conference. The
cablegram said: "The Financial Com-
mittee of the Reparations Confer-
ence) may make a most serious mis-
take and may wreck immediate pro-
spects of settlement unless they un-
derstand quite finally that the ex-
perts report (that adopted at Paris
embodying the Young plan) requires
readjustment to meet the just
claims of this country.

"Respective of party or section

in the House of Commons stand by
you.
