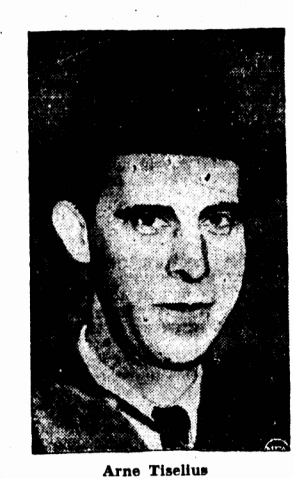
Nobel Awards Go To A Swede, Ex-American And A Briton

The 1948 Nobel prizes in literature, physics and chemistry have been awarded respectively to T. S. Eliot, American-born poet; Patrick M. S. Blackett, British physicist; and Arne Tiselius, Swedish biochemist. Eliot, who has lived in England for many years, was honored "as a pioneer in the field of modern poetry." Blackett, professor of Physics at Manchester University, received his prize for work in cosmic radiation. Tiselius, of Sweden's Uppsala University, was honored for discoveries in the field of absorption analysis. Prizes are worth about \$44,500 each.

Prime Minister King To Resign Monday

OTTAWA, Nov. 11 — (CP) — Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, ailing and weakened by leadership of a country through the turmoil of war and the uneasy peace, announced Wednesday he will retire as Prime Minister of Canada next Monday, Nov. 15. On that day, he said, he will tender his resignation to the Governor-General, Viscount Alexander. The last official act will bring the 73-year-old statesman to the end of the longest term of office recorded by any prime minister in written commonwealth history. He will have served 21 years, five months and eight days — a total of 7,829 days. The Governor-General is expected immediately to call on Rt. Hon. St. Louis Laurent, as leader of the majority party in the Commons, to form a new government. The cabinet make-up is expected to be virtually unchanged from that now existing.

Canada Remembers Dead Of Two World Wars

(By The Canadian Press) Veterans of two world wars mingled their brightly-colored berets yesterday before poppy-laden memorials as they remembered their dead comrades. The first light of dawn fell on 7,000 graves in the soldier's plot at Sidney's Prospect Cemetery as Lt. Col. Sidney Lambert, who served as a padre with men of both wars, began a remembrance service attended by 700 persons. The carillon of Soldier's Tower, a memorial to the war dead of the University of Toronto, chimed as Dr. H. J. Cody, president emeritus, led a similar service. A bugler sounded the Last Post as downtown Toronto crowds gathered to watch Mayor H. E. McCallum place a wreath on the city hall cenotaph. The Governor-General, Viscount Alexander, in the uniform of a field marshal, placed the first of many wreaths on the national war memorial in Ottawa. Representative of the mothers of Canada, Mrs. C. H. McDonald of Ottawa who lost two sons in the Second World War, placed the second wreath. The third was placed by Acting Prime Minister St. Laurent. Then followed wreaths placed by representatives of Russia, Britain,

Work Proceeding On Eight Engine Plane

BRISTOL, England, Nov. 11 — (Reuters) — The Brabazon Mark 11, world's biggest landplane, has had its eight engines installed and its main structure is substantially complete, the Bristol Aeroplane Company announced today. The Brabazon is the £12,000,000 prototype of an airliner which will carry 72 passengers across the Atlantic in seven hours and which Britain hopes will dominate luxury air travel.

DROUGHT IN AUSTRALIA

BRISBANE, Nov. 11 — (Reuters) — Cattle are dying like flies in the Georgia River channel country where the borders of Queensland and South Australia meet. The deaths have been caused by severe drought in the heart of Australia's beef cattle industry. Large areas of grazing land are becoming bare.

U. S. Shipping Strike Boon To Halifax

HALIFAX, Nov. 11 — (CP) — Activity in this old port was building up to a tempo reminiscent of war years tonight as luxury liners, originally destined for New York, lay at anchor here or were due to arrive within a matter of hours. First to arrive, the 35,877-ton Mauretania slid into port under cloudy Remembrance Day skies, chills with a threat of rain. Striking longshoremen along the Eastern United States seaboard have caused the wholesale diversion of ships to Halifax.

MONCTON CONTRACTOR DIES

MONCTON, N.B., Nov. 11 — (CP) — Reid McManus, 74-year-old Moncton contractor, died today after a short illness. He had been a member of the school board here for 30 years. Mr. McManus, an ardent Roman Catholic, was decorated by Pope Pius XI in 1937. Funeral will be Saturday.

Planes Outside Corridors Will Be Forced Down

Dalhousie Professor Dies Of Injuries

HALIFAX, Nov. 11 — (CP) — Dr. Loehner Richter, 54-year-old German-born economist and professor at Dalhousie University, died today from injuries suffered in a traffic accident Monday. Dr. Richter, a high official in the Labor Ministry of the democratic Weimar republic, was executive director of the Institute of Public Affairs at Dalhousie, to which he came 14 years ago. He died from a hemorrhage of the brain, resulting from injuries suffered when his bicycle was struck by a car while he was en route to lectures early Monday. At first his injuries were not believed serious and death came as a great shock to faculty and students at Dalhousie. Quitting Germany at the advent of the Nazis, Dr. Richter moved to England in 1933.

Declares U. S. Is Not Running Out Of Oil

CHICAGO, Nov. 11 — (AP) — The United States "is not running out of oil," a committee of the American Petroleum Institute reported today. L. F. McCollum, chairman of the A.P.I.'s committee on long-term petroleum availability, said the group had found that "substantially increased amounts of petroleum from natural sources will be available in the United States in the next few years."

Gardiner Blames Britain For Her Bacon Shortage

OTTAWA, Nov. 11 — (CP) — Agriculture Minister Gardiner yesterday blamed Britain herself for her developing shortage of bacon. In a prepared statement, he traced the fault back to 1943 when the United Kingdom notified Canada that she would not be able to import as much bacon after the war. As a result of that information, Canadian farmers reduced their hog production. Mr. Gardiner look exception to a London dispatch which quoted Food Minister Strachey as saying a temporary decline in Canadian supplies was responsible for a cut in Britain's bacon ration. Mr. Gardiner said: "There is no doubt Canada has lived up to past contracts and could be supplying the United Kingdom with at least twice as much bacon as she is providing at a different policy could have been followed by the United Kingdom from 1943 to the present, and that if she were able to encourage food supplies for the future from Can-

Most Of Loot From Private Deposit Boxes

(By The Canadian Press) MAXVILLE, Ont., Nov. 11 — Duplicating an unsolved bank robbery last year, thieves broke into the Bank of Nova Scotia here early today and escaped with loot which first estimates placed as high as \$250,000. As in the July 29, 1947, raid on the Bank of Nova Scotia's branch at Carp, Ont., the thieves concentrated on privately-held safety deposit boxes after cutting their way through a 2 1/2-ton steel door on the vault.

Ontario Provincial Police Said Last Night's Raid 'Looks Like A Duplicate Of The Carp Robbery'

The thieves smashed a washroom window at the rear to get into the two-story, red-brick bank building. Using an acetylene torch which they left behind later, they cut
