Races at Truro will feature a Free for All with a purse of \$300, in which Simcoe Harvester 2:04 1/4 will make his first appearance since last July when he was retired owing to injuries. Johnny Conroy has the ex-Ontario champion in rare form.

The Royal Canadian Navy has taken over the Exhibition grounds and race track at Halifax and will utilize all of it with the exception of possibly the rink during the winter. The horsemen stabled there are moving out, most of them likely to Truro. There is much disappointment that no opportunity will be afforded to race at Halifax but no horseman grumbles because he realizes that the track and grounds are being made excellently use of for very necessary purposes.

The Directors of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association have had it in mind for some time and have made plans accordingly to hold an Old Home Week, the program to be similar to those of other years — full Vaudeville program, Midway and Evening shows. Great preparations have been made to advertise the event but a hold-up occurred due to uncertainty over passport regulations. Now that this has been clarified, an announcement will be made after the Directors' meeting Tuesday morning.

One of the starters at North Sydney Dominion Day will be the four-year-old Dinal G. by Single G. 1:59 1/2. He was imported as a year-old colt from Indiana and has not been raced although trained last season.

Peter at Court by Peter Henley, is a colt imported from Ontario this year that is showing well in training at North Sydney.

Billy Hood, well known to local horse lovers, has a four-year-old stable that he will race at North Sydney, Dominion Day. Jerry Bars 2:11 1/2, Peter Hal 2:05 1/2, Dermot 2:04 1/2 and Dinal G. Last season Dermot was raced with singular success by Mike Jabber. It will be interesting to see whether Billy Hood can do as well with this free-for-all.

The fastest mile of the season was paced by Jack Azoff 1:59 1/2 on Wednesday when she stepped in 2:13 with the last half in 1:04. Barney Hanover 2:07 1/4 was a mile in 2:15, Aaron L. and Direct L. worked in 2:18, Millie Kalmuck and Miss Victoria in 2:19 1/2, Joe Volo and Margaret's Abbe in 2:20, Nell Cochatoade in 2:18 1/2, Little Aubrey in 2:24, June Evans trotted in 2:19 with a half in 1:06 1/2.

New Glasgow, N.S., will hold races July 17th followed by North Sydney, July 24th, Inverness July 31st to August 2nd. Locally Kensington races have been announced for July 17th with Montague following.

Max Baer, Tony Galento Match Has Little Of Top Qualifications

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—Max Baer and Tony Galento, those two striking examples of the simple life, or maybe it should be simple examples of the striking life, meet next Tuesday in Jersey City, and what they have in the way of qualifications for their profession is more than offset by what they don't have.

To begin with, the affair is laughably billed as a boxing contest. In the case of both Max and Tony any resemblance of their performances to boxing is coincidental and without malice aforethought.

Tony doesn't have a left hand. Baer doesn't have a left hand. Both have had their deficiencies developed by developing a backhand.

Neither is an up-and-coming youngster nearing his peak. Max reached his some years ago, and Tony just went up and down a foothill. He's probably no better or no worse than he is on his best day.

Neither, if occasion demands, will try to remember everything in the rule book.

Both men have been talking a great fight, getting about 12 bumps to the mile out of their gas. In fact, after listening to both parties, it's difficult to determine who is calling the other fighter a bum and who is calling the other bum a fighter.

On the face of it, the fight is a difficult one to forecast. Galento despite the handicap of a balloon chassis, can hit with his left like nobody's business, and he has the heart of a tiger.

Baer outwardly still is a superb specimen physically. He can hit with his right, but on occasion he has shown no heart at his work.

If he thinks he can beat Galento, and the old victory urge returns, he may do it. In fact, just as a guess, we think he will, bearing in mind the sage remark of Joe Louis:

"The one who gets out first will lose."

Air Ministry Reveals Exploits Of Canadian Flier

LONDON, June 28 (CP)—The Air Ministry tonight told the exploits of a gallant young Canadian pilot in relaying the series of punishing blows dealt by the Royal Air Force against the Nazis during the last 24 hours.

Shortly after the statement was issued, residents of the southeast coast heard explosions at Calais for an hour and the noise of German anti-aircraft guns apparently firing at British planes attacking the German-held port on the French side of the channel, 22 miles from Dover.

The Canadian, a Winnipeg pilot, in a Hudson plane of the coastal command, arrived over Wilhelmshaven harbor, the Netherlands, while on dawn patrol. He shut off his engine and dived quietly from 10,000 feet.

"The explosion of his bombs was the first thing the German ground defenses knew of his presence," the Ministry said. The bombs caused heavy explosions in ammunition stores and a large fire among buildings at the docks.

In its manifold operations during the period, the R.A.F. lost nine planes.

Patrols and reconnaissance flights took place all along the coasts of the North Sea and English Channel, as far north as Scandinavia.

Damage was done to enemy shipping, seaplane bases and oil tanks. Bombers ranged as far afield as Copenhagen capital of Nazi-held Denmark, setting afire oil tanks at Nyborg Island, near the city.

Other planes struck barges on a canal near Reisenbeck, lock gates on Dortmundmuns Canal, and inland docks near Duisberg. A munitions factory at Heerd, near Dusseldorf, was bombed.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., June 28 (AP)—Whitlow Wyatt outpitched young Dick Erickson today to bring Brooklyn Dodgers a 2-1 victory over Boston Bees in an eighth-inning National League game halted by rain.

The Dodgers' star righthander held the Bees to five hits and struck out six in achieving his seventh triumph of the year.

Erickson was just as effective except for a fatal lurch in the fifth inning when Brooklyn batted four of its seven hits and both its runs.

GROSSINGER LAKE, N. Y., June 28 (AP)—Low Jenkins, world's lightweight boxing champion, today announced his fight with Henry Armstrong, was served with a notice today of a supreme court action alleging he failed to fulfill a contract to meet Little Jack Sharkey April 2.

Hymie Caplan, Jenkins' manager, said the suit, brought by the Halsey Street Sporting Club of Brooklyn, operator of the Broadway Arena, was not instituted in good faith.

Jenkins must file an answer Wednesday in Brooklyn supreme court to the suit requiring him to perform the alleged contract.

Famous No-hit No-run Pitcher Back To Minors

CINCINNATI, O., June 28 (CP)—The bubble of Johnny Vander Meer, the only pitcher in the history of baseball to hurl two no-hit no-run games in succession, burst today when the burly 29-year-old southpaw of the National League-leading Cincinnati Reds voluntarily returned to the minors.

Vander Meer was optioned at his own request to Indianapolis of the American Association, a Reds' farm, with provision for 24-hour recall.

The injury jinx hovered over Vander Meer constantly after he catapulted into baseball's hall of fame with a 3-0 no-hitter over Boston's Bees on June 11, 1938 at Crosley Field. Four days later, in a night game, he duplicated the feat with a 6-0 triumph over Brooklyn Dodgers.

He continued his amazing streak in Boston June 19 until his hitless string reached 29 2/3 innings, a record that supplanted the mark of 17 1/3 innings set by Dazzy Vance in 1925.

Vander Meer was plagued with an attack of boils in the summer of 1938 and after that he underwent a tonsillectomy. However, he managed to win 13 games while losing ten and struck third in strikeouts in the National League with 125 in 223 innings.

Vander Meer remained a question mark at the opening of the 1939 campaign. He was troubled by a sore arm and abdominal trouble and won only five games and lost nine during the Reds' pennant drive. This year he was battered from the box early in each of two starts.

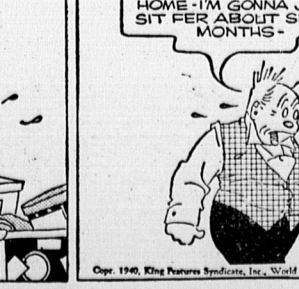

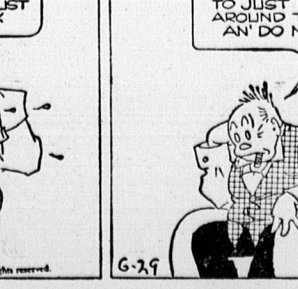
