### Rodman Law The Human Fly Passed Away

GREENVILLE, S. C., Oct. 29.—F. Rodman Law, aviator and parachute leaper, who startled New York, Chicago and other cities by his feats, died recently at the Camp Sevier Hospital, of pulmonary tuberculosis. He was a brother of Ruth Law, the aviatrix. Law attracted much attention in Boston in 1913 when he offered to bet \$50 that he would scale Bunker Hill Monument and put his hat on the top of it. The offer was made to the late Police Commissioner O'Meara. Needless to say, the bet was not taken; not did Law ever try to scale the monument. He did, however, walk on the window ledges of the Bacon Building on Washington street, while he was advertising a fair in 1914. He had started to climb the front of the building when the police interfered.

Law seldom was injured, but when he varied his usual programme by permitting himself to be shot out of an improvised cannon he was severely burned. He had been ill in the hospital at Greenville for several months. His relatives live in Chicago.

It will be recalled that Rodman Law made a visit to St. John for the purpose of swimming through the Reversing Falls. The intrepid American was lowered into the worst portion of the falls by a rope and found the currents too strong to be resisted. For this reason and also because of local opposition to such an enterprise he gave up the attempt and left the city. The stunt was to be enacted for the benefit of moving picture photographers.

Law performed "stunts" that earned for him the name of "the human fly." Attention was first attracted to him by the feats he performed in scaling tall buildings. He thus climbed the Flat Iron Building in New York. He not only excited wonder by the way in which he mounted the perpendicular surfaces of the sky scrapers, but he added to his fame by making a parachute jump from the torch of the Statue of Liberty on Bedloe's Island and by dropping from the Brooklyn and Queensborough bridges. He dropped from the latter at a time when the water was filled with cakes of floating ice and was obliged to keep himself afloat for half an hour before boats reached him. His feet and hands were frozen; but he recovered without serious injury.

Law had been earning a meagre living by performing his "stunts" when he conceived the idea that he could sell his peculiar talents to the moving picture industry, and many of his dare-devil feats were performed in order that the men with the cameras might record them. The development of the airplane gave Law new opportunities. He early demonstrated that it was possible to make parachute descents from planes. On June 26, 1912, he leaped from an aeroplane flying at an altitude of 3,000 feet over Hicksville, (L. I.), and supported by his parachute descended in safety. Six years later as a member of the aviation service of the United States Army, he made a similar leap from an airplane at San Antonio, Texas. Had the Allied governments profited by Law's experience, parachutes might have saved the lives of many aviators who perished during the fighting in France.

The man who thus defied death was born in Lynn about thirty-five years ago. He came of a family which had been represented in all the wars in which the United States had been engaged. That courage and skill in perilous enterprise are a family trait is shown by the career of Miss Ruth Law, the dead man's sister. In appearance Law suggested the student rather than the athlete. He was of slight build and mild in manner. Yet in

counting the activities of his early man hood he said once, in an interview, that he had been a circus rider, a strike breaker, a sailor before the mast, a steeple-jack, an iron worker and a worker in a caisson under air pressure. In his own language, his explanation of his success in his remarkable activities was given as follows:

"You see, I'm built double strength. (He pulled up a sleeve, exhibiting an almost scrawny ladylike arm.) Doctors who have examined me tell me I'm double thickness all over. That arm looks mighty little, but it's as strong as the heaviest piece of beef that ever lifted iron. A cut that goes deep in the ordinary man's flesh would hardly draw blood from me. My muscles are all so compact that they compare in strength to the biggest there are. My bones are as tough as steel.

"Well take that little instance where my skull was fractured. The blow came directly behind the ear. That blow would kill an ordinary man. It managed to crack my skull, but I wasn't unconscious a minute. Now, that I remember, it didn't hurt much either.

"Well, to get back to my story, I'd often wondered if it wouldn't be nice to be able to climb straight up a sheer brick wall. I fiddled around with a lot of contraptions and finally evolved a set of hand and foot grips which I could sink into the mortar between bricks and climb that way. I could go up a twenty-story building that was absolutely smooth. I've done it. However for motion-picture purposes, that is pretty poor stuff. It takes too long. I have to have something like the Flatiron Building, where there are a lot of ridges for me to hold to and where I can climb from one to the other swiftly. I went up the Flatiron Building, right at the outside curve there, where all those funny little pieces of stone ledging stick out, in exactly six and a half minutes. That's not so bad for a picture you see.

"Hard? Not in the least. All you have to do is see that there's no dust under your fingers, so your grip won't slip. Of course, you've got to have a pretty good bunch of muscle. As long as your nerve doesn't slip your feet won't either. Before I start up a building, I look it over from the ground and get a good idea of the rough places and ledges where I can get a foot or hand hold. Then I start up. Every time before I place my hand on a ledge for a grip I get every speck of dust off. Then with my four fingers I bear down on the ledge, while I press against perpendicular surface with my thumb for greater purchase. You couldn't break that grip with a crowbar."

### KING OF SPAIN ON BATTLEFIELD OF VERDUN

VERDUN, Oct. 25.—Over the historic and tragic battlefield of Verdun, King Alfonso of Spain walked today with Marshal Petain, the chief defender of the citadel during the tremendous struggle that was fought in February and March, 1916.

The King proceeded to the military cemetery, where he deposited a wreath of orchids, tied with wide ribbons, forming the Spanish colors, upon which was pinned a tribute from the royal visitor.

The party then turned to battlefield, reaching Fort Douaumont at 10 o'clock. Great interest in the fort was evidenced by King Alfonso who asked to be shown the underground passage leading to the outer redoubts. When he and the Marshal emerged from the deep shelters, they were both stained with mud.

France was not surprised by the German offensive against Verdun. Marshal Petain told the King during their walk over the field. The latter expressed his surprise when given this information, as it has been generally believed the Germans launched their attack almost without warning. "We knew of the enemy's plan," said the Marshal in describing the battle, "six weeks before, we had received our first information from learning of the construction of a formidable system of railroads leading to Verdun.

"As proof that we were not surpris-

ed, I may say we sent for the Twentieth Corps, which reached Verdun on February 25. It did not fall from Heaven. However, the fact remains that when the battle of Verdun began we had on the right bank of the Meuse only two divisions opposing five German Army corps. These two divisions held their positions for five days."
