## IN MEMORIAM

MRS. M. J. FEEHAN

The sympathy of the entire community, many friends in the province and elsewhere is being extended to Mr. M. J. Feehan and family of Mount Stewart on the death of Mrs. M. J. Feehan which sad event took place at her home on the evening of Monday, May 9th.

Deceased who was in her 71st year was possessed of a most kindly, cheerful and charitable disposition, and had the pleasing faculty of making and retaining numerous friends, who tenderly placed many spiritual and floral bouquets on her casket.

The late Mrs. Feehan had been in failing health for almost a year, but bore her long illness with such sublime patience and Christian fortitude that even those who had felt for some time that the end was drawing near were shocked when the final summons came. Her sufferings were mitigated by the loving care of her family but in spite of every attention and all that medical skill could accomplish. God in His wisdom decreed that she could no longer be spared to her beloved family who had the sweet consolation of knowing that nothing had been left undone to stay the hand of death.

Her kind pastor Rev. A. P. McLellan, St. Andrews, had frequently visited her and she died fortified by the sacraments and rites of her holy religion.

Besides her grief-stricken husband she leaves to mourn the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Frank Kelly, Morell; Mrs. John A. McDonald, Scotchfort; Mrs. Urban McDonald, Maple Hill and Elsie at home, also Joseph, Frank Jack and Bernard of Mount Stewart.

Her funeral to St. Andrews church was one of the largest seen in that parish for some time, there being about one hundred carriages.

A High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father McIntyre of Tracadie. After the service at the grave which was conducted by Rev. A. P. McLellan all that was mortal of a loving wife and mother were laid to rest in the family plot.

MR. WILLIAM G. SUTHERLAND

The passing of the late William G. Sutherland removes a man who was more than ordinary in many ways.

The deceased was born in New London a little over fifty years ago. About fifteen years ago he moved to Montague where he purchased the mill property formerly owned by Norman McDonald, and since that he has built up a very large lumber and milling business.

The deceased had no ambition to enter public life, and it was when on the most urgent solicitation of his friends that he was induced to enter public life.

During the time that he has been a member of the House he has proved a valuable councillor in regard to Legislation. He attended to his Legislative duties for the greater part of the last session. Though he had been in failing health for the last four years, it was not anticipated that the end would come so soon. The deceased was a member of the St. Andrews Presbyterian church and of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows under the auspices of which society the funeral was conducted.

The deceased was laid to rest on May 6th, the funeral being one of the largest seen in Montague for many years.

The pall bearers were H. W. Ives, Maynard McDonald, W. G. McDonald, R. McMillan, Dr. A. E. Smith and John A. Stewart. The funeral service was held in St. Andrews Presbyterian church at Montague where an appropriate and eloquent address was delivered by the Rev. J. D. McKenzie, pastor of the church assisted by Rev. Mr. Stewart. Before the service began the Rev. Mr. McKenzie called upon Premier Bell who was present, to make a few remarks.

The Premier stated that the Province had lost a very valuable advisor in the death of the deceased. He stated that the departed was a man of few words but that his counsel was always sought on legislative matters and his advice was nearly always followed. Mr. McKenzie resuming his service, took for his text the 1st Psalm, and in the course of his address he compared the deceased to the person described in this portion of Scripture. He made reference to the deceased from various stand points, that he was a man to be admired for his appearance and physical strength; that he was a man to be respected in regard to his conduct as a father and as a husband; and that, above all he was a man of splendid moral character and blameless life. Mr. McKenzie completed a splendid address by making fitting reference to the family of the deceased.

The relatives that are left to mourn besides the widow are four children. Mrs. J. J. Stewart at Charlottetown and Margaret, George and Jennie at home. Two sisters, Mrs. Dr. McIntyre, Montague and Mrs. John Campbell at Long River, also three brothers, Gordon and Robert in British Columbia and Daniel in Winnipeg.

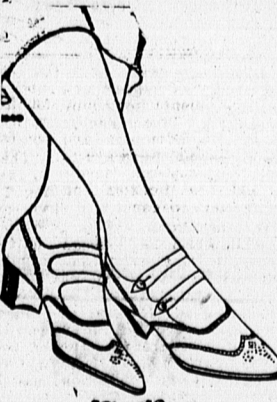

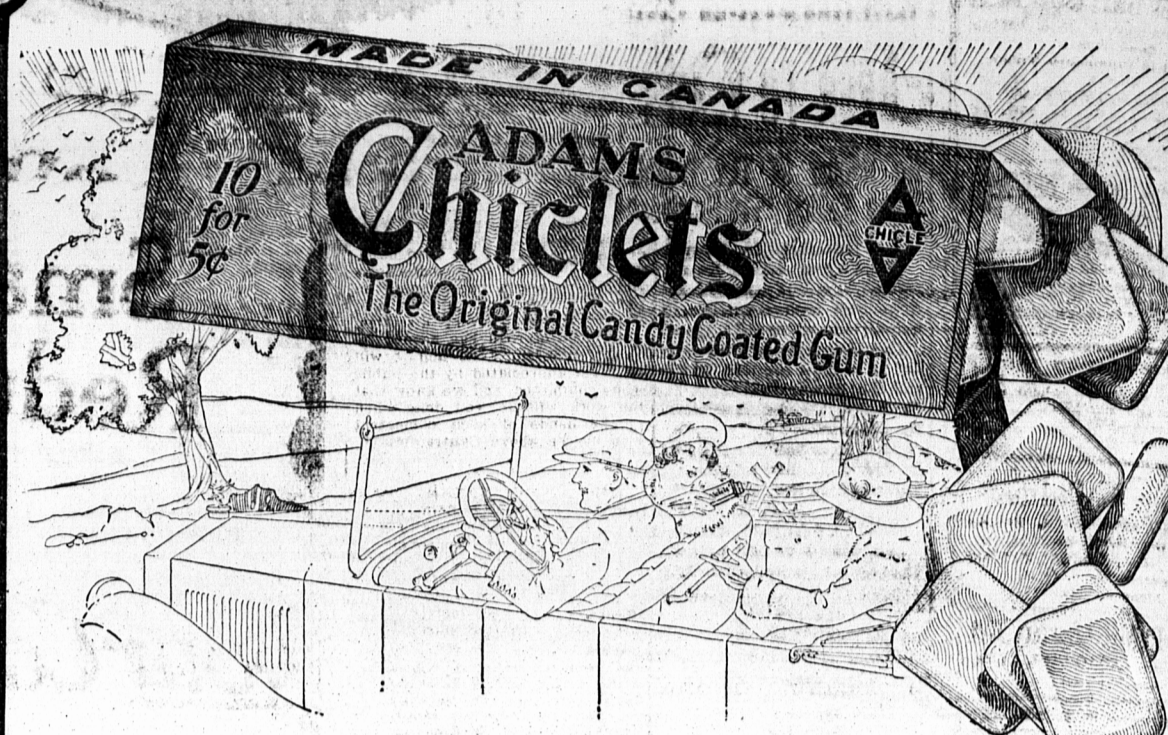

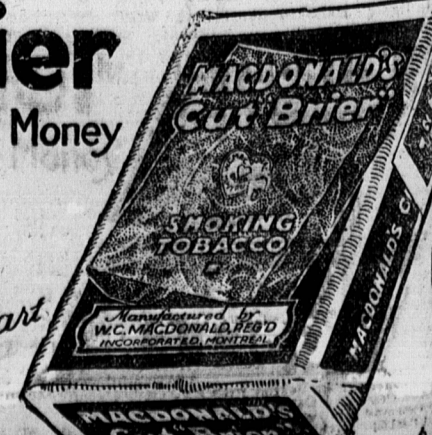
