ynopsis Canadian Northwest Land Regulations
The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in every three years.
Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, see certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

It is also desirable that the public and the railway's connections adopt and put into practice at once the new title in addressing communications, reports and general correspondence to the various officers of the "Canadian National Railways."

IN MEMORIAM
MR. ISAAC R. PROWSE

In the death of Mr. I. R. Prowse, which occurred on Dec. 19th, 1918, Murray Harbor loses one of its best citizens. Mr. Prowse was born at Brackley Point Road, in this Province, sixty-six years ago. As a boy he learned the harness making trade in Charlottetown and some time afterwards he came to Murray Harbor where he resided for more than forty years. In connection with his trade Mr. Prowse conducted the Prowse Hotel with entire satisfaction to all his patrons. Besides this he has served in the capacity of Roadmaster for over forty years and in this office he gave abundant evidence of care, ability and efficiency. He was a member of the Masonic Foresters and Orange fraternities, and took a live interest in all that pertained to the good of the community. In the Methodist Church of which he was a valued and faithful member, he will be greatly missed. As a public official his place will be hard to fill. As a father and neighbor his departure will be sincerely regretted. He was twice married. His wives were sisters—Miss Elizabeth and Miss Louise J. Beck, of Murray Harbor. His second wife survived him just one week. He leaves a son Cecil (by his first marriage) who resides in B. C., and one daughter Mrs. James Hessian, of Georgetown. There are three brothers—Silas, at Brackley Point Road, and one brother out West and another in Glace Bay, C. B. Two sisters reside in Charlottetown. The funeral took place on the 21st Dec. and was conducted by Rev. E. S. Weeks. The pall bearers were two members from each of the three fraternal societies of which the deceased was a member. Interment was made in Murray Harbor cemetery.

MRS. ISAAC R. PROWSE
Murray Harbor Village and the surrounding communities were shocked and saddened to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. I. R. Prowse, which took place on the 26th Dec. 1918, just one short week after the decease of her husband. Mrs. Prowse's health had not been as good as could be wished for about a year, but no one anticipated anything serious.

However, on the morning of the 26th she suddenly became unconscious, while just before she seemed to be in good spirits and as well as for some time previous. Mrs. Prowse was the daughter of Mr. Samuel Beck, of Murray Harbor and at the time of her death she was only fifty-five years of age. It is not often that a rural community loses a woman whose presence means so much. She was greatly beloved in the Methodist Church of which she was a most devoted and consistent member. She was President of the Women's Missionary Society of the Murray Harbor Circuit for over twelve years and President of the Ladies' Aid, and in these respective offices she manifested splendid judgment, spiritual insight and unstinted devotion. Her place will be hard to fill. The deceased was also President of the local branch of the Red Cross since the outbreak of the war. She rests from her labors and her works follow her. There are left to cherish a hallowed memory one daughter, Mrs. Hessian and one sister, Mrs. Geo. Dunn, and two brothers, Richard and Lemuel Beck, all of Murray Harbor, besides a wide circle of relations and friends. The funeral service was held on the 28th Dec. and was in charge of Rev. E. S. Weeks. Interment was made in Murray Harbor cemetery.

MR. THEODORE WOOD
Seldom has the angel of death made such a lasting impression as when on Thursday, November the fourteenth, here passed away at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Wood, Mt. Tryon, their youngest son. Therefore, aged 33 years.
The deceased was widely known and respected throughout the province by all who had the honor of his acquaintance. Beginning his career as school teacher in different parts of the island, he later accepted the position as Dominion Express Agent on the P. E. I. Railway, from which position he resigned some twenty months ago on account of failing health.
For some time, under the influence of home surroundings, he seemed to rally and to regain some of his former strength but about a year ago he became confined to his bed, where in spite of all that loving care could do he passed away. During his great suffering he was never heard to murmur or complain, putting his trust in the Great Unseen Power, seeming to say, "Thy will be done."
The late Mr. Wood was an active church member, and during his lifetime devoted himself earnestly to the uplifting of the Gospel, being interested in Sunday school work, and during his residence in Charlottetown being usher in the First Methodist church.
He was also for some years a member of Wilsey Lodge, I. O. O. F., Charlottetown.
On Sunday, November 16th, a most impressive funeral service, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Fitzpatrick, was held at the home of his parents. The speaker spoke touchingly of deceased's long illness and most hopefully of his entrance into that Life Beyond to be with Christ, which is far better. Continuing he spoke of the great loss to the bereaved ones, and to make the bereavement harder for the parents, their youngest daughter, Vina, was at the time in the P. E. I. Hospital and when her brother passed away was unable to hear the sad news.
The hymns sung at the service were "Asleep in Jesus," and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus."
He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing father and mother, two sisters, Mrs. Murdoch MacKenzie, of Kipp, Alberta; Miss Vina, of Charlottetown, and three brothers, Joseph, of Atlantic, Mass., and Alexander and Alfred at home.
