STEAMERS COLLIDE

S. S. Tremont Loses 40 Feet off Her Bow

OCEAN RECORD BROKEN

Five Days Eleven Hours Now—Cost of Steel Strike—Cooler Weather.

ANGEROUS STEAMER COLLISION.

New LONDON, CONN., July 17. (Special).—The steamer Tremont of the Joy Line, Boston for New York, with three hundred passengers was in collision at midnight in the sound with the steamer Wildduck.

The Tremont was badly damaged, forty feet of her bow being cut off.

ATLANTIC RECORD BROKEN.

PLYMOUTH, July 17. (Special).—The steamship Deutschland made the passage from New York in five days eleven hours five minutes making a new record.

THE COSTLY STEEL STRIKE.

PITTSBURG, July 17. (Special).—Figures say the steel strike is costing the companies \$210,000 and the workmen \$150,000 daily.

Machinery in The Ship-Yard.

An essential point that should not be lost sight of in connection with all the machines in the ship-yard is the one of upkeep. Independently driven machines, especially those in which steam is employed as the motive power, should be constantly attended to. In some yards it is the custom to employ a man whose sole duty is to test periodically every machine in use. Small steam engines, such as those used for driving punching machines, etc. are in any case not very economical and usually receive little or no attention, whereas if constantly tested any small defects can be immediately remedied and perhaps not only the life of the machine prolonged, but a saving in the coal bill effected. It is not uncommonly the case that engine shops which turn out the very highest class of work are run by old and inferior engines which the owners would not think of building for sale.—Prof. J. H. Biles, in The Engineering Magazine for July.

MAY WITHDRAW TROOPS FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, July 15.—Lord Kitchener has advised the government, the Daily News understands, that it is possible to withdraw a large number of infantry regiments from South Africa, amounting virtually to the greater part of the unmounted army. At the same time he requests that he be supplied with more mounted men.

NEEDS TO APOLOGIZE.

The Chinese official apologist is on his tour and goes first to Germany to apologize for the murder of Baron Ketteler. He ought to stop off here and apologize for the work some of the Chinese laundries turn out.—Halifax Chronicle.

OTTAWA HAS 57,778 PEOPLE.

OTTAWA, July 15.—The population of Ottawa, as taken by the Dominion census enumerators, totals 57,778, as compared with 44,351 in 1891, and increase of 13,424. The increase of 1891 over 1881 was 41 per cent.

PRAYERS FOR RAIN.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., July 15.—At all the churches yesterday prayers were offered for rain. At the Roman Catholic churches prayers are said at each mass daily for rain, under an order of Archbishop Kain of St. Louis. Christian and Presbyterian congregations united in a union service at the Presbyterian church, and prayers for rain were offered.

Governor Dockery is receiving hundreds of requests beseeching him to issue a proclamation to the people to assemble and pray for rain.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And Its Attractions To Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company two Electric Light plants, and a street railway in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its many pleasant drives the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water and clear cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera House. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief resorts of the citizens here. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On the west side in the Park; on the east side are the magnificent new Exhibition Building and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares are Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, a fountain and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has above 3000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedeque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ, Stratheona and Campbell.

Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aitken, Tupper, Revere, Dominion, McConnell, Manuel and Globe hotels and in Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdown Hotel; in Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner in Tignish the Railway and Bellevue; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald, and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View at Stanhope, Mutebe's, and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Seaside; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaford; and at Pownall, Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned here are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodations that many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description abounds.
