**North Americans Eat too Quickly**

EDMONTON, May 20—(CP)—Canadians and Americans eat too quickly. This is the considered opinion of Amedeo Franchi, supervisor of chefs for the Canadian National Railways and a cook since he was 12 years old. "They should take at least an hour for dinner, from the time they sit down until they get up again," he stated. "Instead, they hurry through it; they take as little time as they can."

Franchi, whose idea of a real dish is a god steak, cooked fast, finished rare and eaten slowly, says people are too much for eating "just to fill up, instead of taking time to enjoy beautiful cooking."

The chef, who has prepared food for the Prince of Wales, Lloyd George, the late President Taft and other distinguished personages, said the Prince of Wales liked to have dishes set down before him without ordering beforehand and that the late Sir Henry Thornton "was the hardest man I ever cooked for."

Sir Henry, he said, would order dinner hours before he wanted it and would ask for dishes "that I had to think about for a while before I could remember just how to prepare them."

Quite a variety of dishes were called for at the Imperial Conference, at Ottawa, in 1932, where Franchi was in charge of food preparation. He had to concoct national dishes of the countries from which the visiting delegates came. Epicurean tastes differ very little across the Dominion, he found. In the Maritimes, fish constitutes the main food. In the west it is meat. But everywhere apple pie with cheese and pumpkin pie are the popular desserts.

Owing to the scarcity of bait and the presence of drift ice on the "outside" fishing grounds only a small quantity of lobsters has so far been packed by the factories in this vicinity.


The motor schooner "Millie B" in command of Capt. H. Larsen, with John McDonald Jr. and Theodore Lavers as crew, left on Friday evening for the Magdalen Island where a load of herring for lobster bait purposes will be purchased. On her return these will be sold to the fisherman in this locality.

The S. S. Enterprise arrived in port Sunday afternoon from Sydney and proceeded on her way to Montague. This is her initial trip for this season.

The auxiliary schooner "Francis Robie" commanded by Capt. Goodwin is now in port with a cargo of 75 barrels of herring from Gross Isle, Magdalen Islands. This bait will be available to the fishermen at \$1.50 per barrel. Capt. Goodwin encountered considerable drift ice on his voyage particularly between East Point and Bouris.

Capt. O. M. Fitzgerald is now engaged in getting things in readiness for construction of the new ferry-boat to replace the Hillsboro on the Rocky Point ferry service.

**WASH-BASIN**

To keep the hands clean by regular washing and not touch foods without having given the hands a good washing with plenty of soap and warm water and using a nail-brush, is one of the most practical means whereby we may protect ourselves and others against communicable disease.

The whole purpose of hand-washing is often defeated by the wash-basin. The only sanitary way to wash is in running water. Most wash-basins, however, are constructed with two taps—hot and cold—each with a separate spout. This makes it practically impossible to wash in running water as the water which comes out of the taps is either very hot or very cold.

Strange to say, most basins are equipped with a common spout, so that by adjusting the flow of the two taps, the right temperature is secured. It is, however, rather awkward to use the bath when washing the hands. Why put the type of equipment on the bath which is really needed on the basin, not on the bath?

Wash-basins are provided with stoppers in order that hot and cold water may be mixed. The objection to this is that you not only wash in the dirt which comes off your own hands, but also in what may have been left by previous washers. It is quite possible that your hands, after such washing, may not be as free from germs as they were before you started.

The mouth, from the point of view of disease-germs, is the dirtiest and most dangerous part of the body. The wash-basin, which receives the rinsings from the mouths of the family as they clean their teeth, is more than likely to be badly soiled with any and all of the germs present in the mouths of each member of the family. The wash-basin that is used for teeth cleaning is not safe to wash in until it has been disinfected.

Bad as the wash-basin may be in the home, the public wash-basin is infinitely worse because it is used by greater numbers of persons. Also, many public wash-basins, in order to save water and over-lowing, have spring taps that resist any effort the individual may make to wash or rinse his hands in running water. Trains, at least, do provide a separate basin for brushing the teeth. The dirt we can see is generally speaking, not dangerous. The real danger lies in the invisible dirt—secretions of the body—which carries with it the germs of disease; for example, the saliva deposited on the common drinking-cup. It would seem reasonable, from all we know, to say that hands should be washed in running water—the way the surgeon prepares his hands before an operation—and that all wash-


The rumbling of the political chariot is again heard in the land and gives promise of lively issues pertaining to the "Questions of the Day."

NOVA SCOTIA EGG LAYING CONTEST EXPERIMENTAL FARM, NAPFAN, N. S.

At the close of the seventh four-weekly period on May 15, 1935, the birds entered in the Nova Scotia Contest at the Napfan Experimental Farm, have laid a total of 20,330 eggs, scoring 20,378.8 points. This is equal to 7.3 eggs more per bird than for the same period in 1934.

The leading bird to date is Mr. A. T. Read's Barred Plymouth Rock No. 151 from Rollingdam, N. B., with 173 eggs and 196.5 points. Second is Mr. K. W. Smith's Barred Plymouth Rocks in pen 8, with 139 eggs and 1,377.8 points. Third is Mr. Geo. Waterston's Barred Plymouth Rocks in pen 9, with 160 eggs and 179.5 points, while third bird is Mr. J. M. Scott's Barred Plymouth Rock No. 55 from Seaforth, Ontario, with 163 eggs and 178.5 points.
