Sunday is to these people a great day; full of religious practices in the morning, full of amusement in the afternoon and evening. Three evenings are set apart during the week for the purpose of courting, and known among the young people as bonsoirs, but the best time of all is by far on Sunday. On a beautiful Sunday afternoon, a young man, the son of a well-to-do farmer, is out for a drive. Of course everything is stale in his own immediate neighborhood. Girls are prettier and sweeter in the next parish than they are in one's own—in fact, the farther you go the better. Well, then, ten or fifteen miles from his home there is a girl. There are hundreds along the way, not mentioning the one who lives across the road, with whom he played when he was a child. But all these are of no account. For him the parish of Sainte-Marie, or Marie, or Saint-Jean, or some other saint, is the centre of the universe. 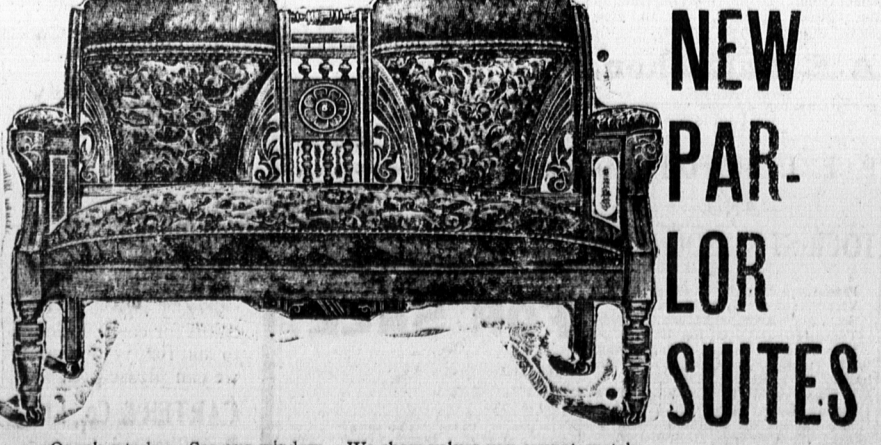
