THE COMING YACHT RACE.

Fifty years ago, at the time of the first world's exhibition held in London in 1851 a yacht competition was held, open to all nations, the prize being a £500 cup. Commodore J. C. Stevens of the New York Yacht Club crossed the Atlantic to compete in the schooner-yacht America. The race took place August 22 of that year. The course was around the Isle of Wight, and the America beat all of the 18 contestants by about seven miles. In 1857 Mr. Stevens presented the cup to the New York Yacht Club and made it a prize open to competition by all nations. This is the cup which Sir Thomas Lipton will endeavor to win back again after its half century of continuous possession in America.

Eleven times the right to hold the cup has been challenged and ten times it has been successfully defended. Sometimes the international race has resulted in an aftermath of ill-feeling, as in the case of Lord Dunraven and the Valkyrie in 1895. All this has long since died out however, and both British and Americans recognise in Sir Thomas Lipton a genuine sportsman and a genial good fellow. He was the tenth challenger, and although unsuccessful in his first venture took his defeat cheerfully, admitting that he was fairly beaten, but determined to try again. The result will be the race shortly to come off in which the new Shamrock as challenger will be matched against the Columbia or the Constitution as defender.

The greatest interest is felt on both sides of the Atlantic in the coming contest. King Edward, it will be remembered, showed his interest by going on board Shamrock II as the guest of Sir Thomas Lipton during one of her trial races some months ago, and he had a narrow escape in a squall, which struck and disabled the yacht. Many thousands of His Majesty's subjects take an interest in the coming competition, and it is safe to say that the interest is not less intense throughout the United States from the President down to the ordinary citizen. Hitherto the defenders have beaten all comers until the long succession of victories has become almost monotonous.

This time a stiff contest is expected, and while it seems probable enough that the cup will again be successfully defended, Sir Thomas Lipton and his friends are by no means without hope. It has been pretty well established, at least, that the new Shamrock is a faster yacht than Shamrock I. She is lighter in construction and spreads 10 per cent more sail. She will be at her best in anything more than an eight knot breeze, but will not do so well in lighter air. At her first trials with her older namesake the new boat did not compare so favorably, but before crossing to this side of the Atlantic she beat the old Shamrock 3 minutes in 13 1/2 miles going to windward, and going to leeward in a 17 knot breeze out-sailed her by 4 1/2 minutes in the same distance. It is estimated that in a 15 knot breeze the new boat can sail over the prescribed course in 12 minutes better time than the old Shamrock. Probably the Columbia, should she be finally selected as the defender, may also do something better than she did before, but in any case the experts conclude that the competing yachts will be found to be pretty evenly matched.

ST. PAUL'S IN DANGER.

St. Paul's Cathedral, London, one of the most celebrated buildings in the world, is reported to be in danger from the settling of its foundations. Already the walls are cracked from top to bottom, and grave concern is felt lest greater damage may ensue. Sewers under the streets and an underground tunnel not far away have sapped the foundations.

St. Paul's was designed by Sir Christopher Wren to take the place of the old cathedral destroyed in the great fire of 1638. The new cathedral was first used for divine service in 1667 and was completed in 1710, the cost being about \$3,500,000. Its dimensions on the ground are 500 by 118 feet. In plan and architecture it resembles St. Peter's at Rome, but is only one half as great in area, and relatively longer and narrower. The height of the dome is 223 feet and the height to the top of the cross 334 feet.

The foundation for so great a structure is now known to have been insecure from the first. "Unfortunately for Sir Christopher Wren's fame as an engineer," says the Scientific American, "he failed to drive piles or to excavate deep enough to place the foundation on a firm substratum, so that he practically floated the Cathedral on a layer of fine clay, or 'pot earth' as he was pleased to call it, resting on a stratum of sand mixed with gravel and water. But he knew of the existence of a bed of hard clay some 40 feet below the surface, though he did not carry his foundation so far down, owing probably to the smallness of available funds."

The friends of Sir Louis Davies in West Queensa desiring to show their appreciation and to say a word of farewell to him on his approaching retirement from political life, have arranged for two picnics, the first to be held at French River on Friday next at one o'clock in the afternoon for the north end of the Riding and the second to be held at Kingston on Saturday afternoon. In both cases energetic committees have the matter in hand and large and enthusiastic gatherings are expected. Both will be basket picnics, but there will be refreshment tables on the grounds.

There is little news to note in the Boer war these days. Lord Kitchener's men continue to make captures of prisoners, ammunition and live stock from time to time, and at rare intervals some small British post is surprised and some losses occur. The scenes of greatest activity on the part of the enemy are in Cape Colony and the Transvaal—at the two extremes of the country. Delarey has issued a proclamation in reply to that of Lord Kitchener, and says the Boers will continue the struggle, and this they doubtless will do for some time longer, although they are getting pretty well worn out by this time.

The St. John Globe thinks it not improbable that Sir Louis Davies will become first a Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, and later, on the retirement of Sir William Strong, will become Chief Justice. Sir William's retirement will open the way for a new Judge from Ontario, and Hon. David Mills will probably be selected for that position. Mr. Mills, while indisputably an able man, is much Sir Louis' junior as a lawyer, having only been called to the bar in 1873. Sir Louis was called to the bar in 1833, and has been much more eminent in the profession than Mr. Mills. As the choice for Chief Justice may fall between these two there seems good reason to believe that Sir Louis may yet become the head of the Supreme Court of Canada if he so desires. And in this latitude nothing will be thought too good for Prince Edward Island's favorite son.
