Rebuild Edifice Twice Destroyed (By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 19 — Plans have been completed for the rebuilding of Montreal's first cathedral for the second time since its creation 112 years ago. The towering 312 foot spire is all that remains of the building, destroyed by fire in 1852 and again in 1933.

In 1852 St. Jacques le Mineur Cathedral at St. Catherine and St. Denis Streets, its original site, was partially destroyed when Montreal's east-end was ravaged by fire. The church was rebuilt, in 1888. Fire again razed most of the building March 26, 1933, during high mass. Coolness on the part of the priest and attendants prevented possible fatalities. The new church will cost \$126,000 and seat 1,600 persons. No supporting columns or galleries will obstruct the view. Interior decorating will be ultra-modern and specially treated for acoustics.

C.N.R. Telegraph Lines Extend Greetings (By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 19 — With the approach of the Christmas holiday season, the telegraph companies are busy making arrangements to handle the growing volume of the season's Christmas and New Year's greeting messages and cables, these steadily increasing from year to year in popularity. The telegraph is also used by enterprising merchants who wish to call the attention of customers to the display of Christmas gifts. Santa Claus, it has been found, is also making increased use of the telegraph to advise his many little friends by Santagram that he will be just what is wanted. He arranges with parents for the North Pole and they are delivered direct to the little boy or girl by a uniformed messenger.

Another use of the telegraph which is increasing in popularity is the sending of Christmas and New Year's greetings within the confines of cities in the place of the usual printed message, the cost being approximately the same as a good Christmas or New Year's card. Staffs of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific telegraphs have completed arrangements to take care of this business and handle it with dispatch. Special rates for cable greetings with pre-arranged text or personal messages will be in effect prior to Christmas and New Year's and practically every country in Europe and many other continents are included in the radius of the service. Telegraphs state it is surprising to learn in how many languages these greetings messages are filed.

Silver Price Again Drops

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—The absence of an appreciable demand for silver today sent another shiver of uncertainty through world markets, and prices for the 10th consecutive day dropped in an additional notch.

London, nominal leader of the metal trade, posted a quotation of 23 3-16 pence a standard ounce, off 13-16 of a penny (about 1.81 cents) from the previous day, equivalent to a New York price of 49 1-4 cents a fine ounce.

The New York price, fixed by Handy & Harman, bullion brokers, declined by a wider margin to 53 3-4 cents a fine ounce, off 2 cents from yesterday and the lowest since Feb. 6.

Urges Gov't. Ownership Of Railroads

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 19 — Wheat sales—impetus to wheels of Canadian industry—hold the solution to Canada's economic problems, says John T. Culliton, assistant professor of economics at McGill University here.

Immediate sale of the Western wheat surplus, even at a loss, was the sole remedy to the pressing problems facing the Canadian people, Prof. Culliton told a meeting of the General Accountants' Association. Mr. Culliton said the immense importance of wheat was seen in the fact the average value of the annual crop was \$400,000,000. It was the country's greatest single export and paid for numerous imports such as tea, coffee, cocoa, sugar, oranges and bananas.

With the United States out of the export market and the crops of Australia and the Argentine below normal, the time had come for Canada to dispose of her surplus, Mr. Culliton said. Mr. Culliton expressed the opinion that, if Europe was producing all it could ever produce, the Dominion could look forward to a reduction in wheat tariffs. The international market must be recognized as a competitive market and demands for reduction in wheat acreage as a solution would prove useless. It should be handled as a private enterprise, he said.

Many obstacles had been overcome in making Canada's system of grading the standard of the world. Canada's wheat was marketed with less cost and more effectively than that of any of its competitors.
