A most interesting object shown at the Exhibition in connection with the display of Hillsboro Consolidated School was a reproduction accurately to scale of an old log cabin schoolhouse which formerly stood at Fuller's Marsh not far from the present site of the magnificent school at Hillsboro. The model is a splendid bit of workmanship and affords a valuable means of comparison between the educational advantages of the early days of settlement in this Province and the conditions today.

The New Glasgow, N. S. Chronicle says: A large number of New Glasgow people took in the Island Exhibition now in session at Charlottetown. Those who went over on Tuesday night had an excellent opportunity of enjoying the sea breezes, it is almost unnecessary to say that several of the excursionists "funked" at the last moment as the steamer was about to leave the Pictou wharf. The Island fair makes good its purpose to a much greater extent than our Provincial fair. Live stock buyers from all over the Maritime Provinces go there to look over and purchase the best of the Island produce, in this way thousands of dollars are left in the hands of the Island breeders. On account of the distance of Halifax from the agricultural centres only superior animals which are not for sale are shown, or if they are offered the price is generally prohibitive.

Cattle from the Provincial Exhibition being taken to P. E. Island, attracted much attention at the railway freight sheds on Friday and Saturday. On the latter afternoon there was much excitement and not a little merriment, over the antics of a young steer, who had broken away from its keeper. The animal raced about wildly and finally jumped into the harbor. He swam easily and was well on from the wharves before two young men in a boat succeeded in getting a rope around his neck. They led him ashore or rather almost ashore, when as he touched bottom there was something doing once more. Doid Dwyer was called for with his lasso and succeeded in throwing the frenzied animal, but not until he had upset the boat and caused some spectators nearby to take a sudden tumble into the water. One unfortunate, who was among the interested onlookers, says that no picture in Fairyland could surpass that of the Island steer doing his stunts.—Pictou Advocate.
