THE COOK'S CORNER

GOLD CAKE
1-2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
3 egg yolks
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups cake flour
2-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1-1/2 teaspoon salt
3-4 cup milk

Method: Cream the sugar and butter (or shortening) very, very light. Beat the egg yolks until they are thick and lemon colored, and be sure to do this thoroughly, for it makes all the difference in the world in the cake.

Turn into a well greased loaf pan about 8 inches square, and bake in a moderate 310 deg. F. oven for about 1 hour.

ORANGE-LEMON ICING
3 tablespoons soft butter
1 tablespoon grated orange rind
3 cups icing sugar (about)
2 tablespoons orange juice
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1-1/2 teaspoon salt

Method: Cream the butter and the orange rind, then add 1 cup of the sugar and beat to a cream. Mix the orange and lemon juice and add alternately with the rest of the sugar until it is of the right consistency to spread. Add the salt and beat hard.

Spread over the sides and top of the cake and then sprinkle with a tablespoon of grated orange rind.

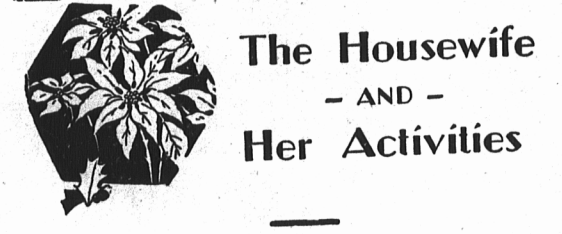

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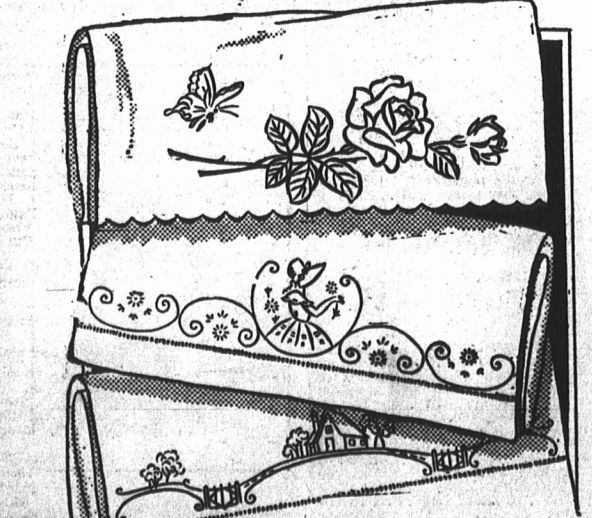
