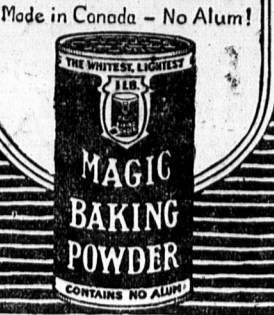
"I think I'd better be honest with you, even if it costs me money," I said. "The house is cheap because it's well, it isn't an easy house to rent."

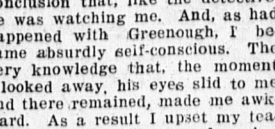

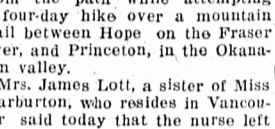
