Dodgers Win Two To Increase Lead Over Cards

BROOKLYN, July 15—(AP)—The swashbuckling Brooklyn Dodgers conquered Chicago Cubs in both ends of a doubleheader today, 7-0 and 8-4 to inflate their National League lead to four full games over St. Louis Cardinals.

In each game the Dodgers pounced on the Cubs for an early lead and protected it with superb pitching to the great satisfaction of a crowd of 32,347 fans, second largest turnout of the season at Ebbets field.

At Philadelphia, the second place St. Louis Cardinals and the last place Phillies battled tooth-and-nail before the Red Birds eked out a 2-2 victory on Jimmy Brown's long fly

ve, we have no alternative but to resort to the rationing card.

"Every effort short of public financing is being made to increase Canadian domestic production of crude oil, but with the expected increase by 200,000 barrels in Canada a production this year, it will fall short by nearly 400,000 barrels of supplying the western market alone."

Included with the transportation facilities now supplying products for Canada are eight Norwegian tankers which Britain urgently asks shall be turned over to her at this time. These tankers are capable of bringing in 4,000,000 barrels of crude or 161,000,000 gallons into Canada between now and the close of navigation. The delivery of these tankers will further reduce our stocks, further disrupt our transportation facilities. Nevertheless Britain asks for them Britain needs them and they must go."

The Price Increase

The one-cent increase for a gallon of gasoline, said the controller, is for the purpose of giving partial relief from the increased cost of crude at the base and added cost in transportation. These costs are constantly being checked he said in order that the increase in sale prices shall be in line with them.

War Industry Needs

"Several hundred million gallons of fuel oil are needed yearly by essential war industry. Without oil, our war effort would fail. Also large quantities of bunker oil and fuel oil are essential for our steel mills, for the aluminum company and the many other large industrial enterprises. Without oil these plants would be unable to do that which is expected of them."

Mr. Cottrill emphasized that apart from delivering to Britain the tankers she asks for and needs and apart from giving Britain petroleum products which would otherwise come to Canada, the Dominion's own war effort must be safeguarded and must have priority.

"In order to increase our aid to Britain to ensure our war effort there is no alternative other than the citizens of Canada must deny themselves pleasure driving motor boats, the use of fuel oil where another fuel will do. All non-essential uses must be curtailed by at least 50 per cent, and without
