LIEUTENANT GALT'S DARING.

Describing a letter received in Ottawa, the attack after which Lieut. John Galt of Winnipeg (son of the President of the Union Bank of Canada), was reported missing, another member of Strathcona's Horse says:— "It seems that the enemy had been permitted to build a barrier across the Messines road within a hundred yards of our trenches for the purpose of sapping. It was decided that it had to be captured and blown up. A scheme was arranged for that purpose and fourteen of us, in charge of Lieut. Galt, crawled out at midnight to take it by assault. Within 30 yards of it we charged, but were met by a volley of bombs and rifle bullets. I myself was stung at the edge of the wire entanglements, but managed to crawl to a tree on the left of the road, while most of the party had gone to the right. I soon came to, and realized that we had run into a 'jack-box,' as the barrier was full of Germans and a bombing party was in readiness. We threw bombs over the barrier from our cover, while a hail of bullets from our machine guns played on it. They sent up a red flare signal and their artillery poured shell over us. Also, our batteries opened on our front line. I could see our party crawling back from tree to tree with their wounded. I could not myself go across the open road, as the machine-guns were playing both ways, ours and theirs. However, I managed to get back through the wire. I checked

up the party. Galt, Wilding and Chapman were missing, and eight men were wounded, none very seriously. It was most fortunate that the German bombs were not 'missile' ones, but high explosive of a shattering nature and more for normal effect than for anything else, some of their 'frighthfulness' bombs.

"I was out with Lieut. Galt the night before the reconnoitre. I was sent for afterwards by the General, who said the work was well done, and that it was to be regretted that Mr. Galt and others had been lost."

WAITING IN THE TRENCH.

A British Columbian in Strathcona's Horse, who was not in the bombing party, thus described his experiences in the above incident:—"Everybody had to stand 'to' about midnight, and we stood waiting for the ammunition to begin. Every once in a while a machine gun would begin and we would think the fun had started, but it would die down and everything would be as still as it can be in the country on a fine night. Then, as you'd be starting over the parapet as hard as possible, something round will loom up in front of your eyes, just like a man's head climbing over, you give a start and find it's only a great big fat rat; then one of the beastly things will come and sniff in your ear, which makes a man very mad and you make a big swat at it but seldom do any damage."

The funeral to the Methodist Church, Cherry Valley, Sunday afternoon was one of the largest ever held in that community. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Gould. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Francis McNeil, John Tweedy, John Doyle, Dennis Carey, John Carrier and A. McInnes.

FIREMAN RONALD J. McDONALD DEAD.

Ronald J. McDonald of Boston formerly of P. E. Island and for many years a member of the Boston Fire Department and prominent among the firemen of the city, died Saturday morning Feb. 26th, at the Carney Hospital, where he was operated on last Monday for ulcers of the stomach. He had been ill for some time.

For more than 20 years he was an active fireman, first at Engines 13 and 26-35, then at Engine 7 on East St., where he stayed for two years. In December, 1907, he became president and one of the founders of the Russell Club, a firemen's organization named in honor of Col. Henry S. Russell, who was for more than 10 years Fire Commissioner. The club now includes about 650 firemen. In March, 1908, McDonald was transferred to Engine 1 on Dorchester St., South Boston, and later acquired a beautiful home on Columbia road.

Dec. 24, 1915, he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and ordered to report at Engine 4, Bulfinch St. He stayed there only two or three months when, at his own request, he was detached and ordered back to Engine 1 in South Boston, in order that he might be near his wife, who was sick.

At her request the order was delayed for a time, but finally carried out. Mr. McDonald's health was never good after his return to Engine 1, and the operation was the result.

Upon his retirement from the presidency of the Russell Club in 1909, the members presented him with an easy chair. He was considered one of the best reinmen and horsemen in the service. He is survived only by his wife.
