Begin Extension To S'side Electric Light Plant

Work commenced yesterday morning on the extension to the Summerside Electric Light Plant to house the new unit which has been ordered and is expected to be delivered early in the new year. The contract was awarded on Tuesday evening at a special meeting of the Town Council to Morrison and Harris for \$15,000. Three tenders were opened at the meeting and according to information from the electric light committee yesterday they were as follows: M. F. Schurman Co., Ltd., \$16,875.00; County Construction Co. Ltd., \$16,875.00; Morrison and Harris, \$16,000.00. It was considered that all tenders were a little high and the committee was authorized to give the contract to Morrison and Harris, the lowest bidder for \$15,000, if they would accept it at that price, which they did. The extension is on the east side of the building and consists of a brick addition 33 feet 6 inches by 13 feet 6 inches with a height of 22 feet 6 inches. In addition a base for the new motor must be built and the present brick wall removed.—S
